Luke 9:28b-36

The extreme winter weather is causing a lot of school snow days, and snow days mean we might have an extra kid or two or three around the office. One of them is Jakob, maintenance man Greg Hitt's grandson, a fourth grader at St. Pat's. Relatively quiet as he plays video games on his iPod, Jakob requires minimum care. He sits on the floor beside my chair, occasionally asking a question or charging his iPod with my cord. He loves to make pepperoni rolls with me and loves to eat them even more. Jakob is nine.

One recent Wednesday, my friend from the Christian Alliance came in to pray, as she does every week. Jakob was in one of my office chairs, and I said, "Let Miss Sarah sit there." So, he moved to the other chair. I said, "No, I'm going to sit in that one." He stood by the door, continuing to play his game.

"Jakob, Miss Sarah and I have a meeting now." He stood by the door, waiting. "Um, we're going to pray now. Do you want to go to the kitchen or somewhere?" No, he said he would stay while we prayed. Then he sat on the floor, nose to the screen.

For the next 20 minutes, Sarah and I prayed aloud—for the sick, the community, elected officials, school children and teachers, those with addictions, for our pastors and volunteers, for peace in the world, for travelers. We closed, as we always do, with the Lord's Prayer. I heard Jakob join in. Sarah and I raised our heads and smiled at each other. It was so sweet.

Then Jakob said, "You forgot something." We both looked at him with surprise. "You forgot to pray for the military." Wow. The kid whose eyes hadn't left the iPod game, who had disappeared into the woodwork for 20 minutes, hadn't missed a word. He was right. We had forgotten.

Sarah said to him, "Why don't you say the prayer?" Jakob said, "Dear God, bless the military who fight for our country and keep us free. Keep them safe because they keep us safe." He also asked for blessings on firemen and policemen.

I looked at Jakob in a completely new way.

That's what happened in today's Gospel. Peter, James, and John saw Jesus in a whole new light, the light of glory. Jesus is transfigured before their eyes and is in the company of the great prophet Elijah, representing the voice of God, and Moses, representing God's law.

Before this, Jesus was a carpenter from Nazareth, the guy who invited these fishermen to accompany him on his itinerant preaching job. Imagine their surprise when they hear the voice from heaven: "This is my chosen son; listen to him." It was a turning point in how they looked at this man.

The transfiguration was a turning point for Jesus, too. After meeting with Elijah and Moses and hearing the affirmation from his Father, Jesus left that mountain and headed toward Jerusalem where he would meet his death.

I believe that every day we meet messengers. It's important for me to listen to them, because, in some way, what they are saying is going to impact my life. It isn't always as obvious as a voice from the clouds, but I try to discern what God wants me to hear. It almost always leads to me seeing the person in a different way. Try it sometime.

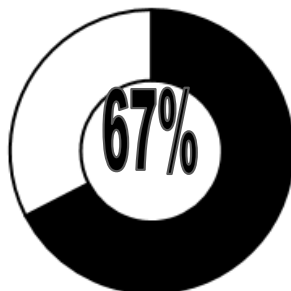

NEW TO THE PARISH?

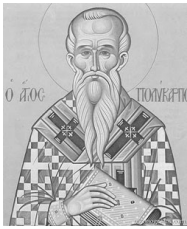

SAINT OF THE WEEK

February 23
St. Polycarp

Polycarp was a disciple of Saint John the Evangelist. With the apostles gone, heresies sprang up pretending to be true teaching, persecution was strong, and controversies arose over how to celebrate liturgy.

Polycarp, as a holy man and bishop of Smyrna, found there was only one answer -- to be true to the life of Jesus and imitate that life. Saint Ignatius of Antioch told Polycarp "Your mind is grounded in God as on an immovable rock."

One day, during a bloody martyrdom when Christians were attacked by wild animals in the Roman arena, the crowd became so mad that they demanded more blood by crying, "Down with the atheists; let Polycarp be found." (They considered Christians "atheists" because they didn't believe in their pantheon of gods.) Since Polycarp was not only known as a leader but as someone holy "even before his grey hair appeared", this was a horrible demand.

Polycarp was calm but others persuaded him to leave the city and hide at a nearby farm. He spent his time in prayer for people he knew and for the Church. During his prayer he saw a vision of his pillow turned to fire and announced to his friends that the dream meant he would be burned alive.

As the search closed in, he moved to another farm, but the police discovered that he was there by torturing two boys. He had a little warning since he was upstairs in the house but he decided to stay, saying, "God's will be done." Then he went downstairs, talked to his captors and fed them a meal. He asked them to give him an hour to pray. He spent two hours praying for everyone he had ever known and for the Church. Many of his captors started to wonder why they were arresting this holy, 86-year-old bishop. But that didn't stop them from taking him into the arena on the Sabbath. The proconsul begged the bishop to give in because of his age. "Say 'Away with the atheists'" the proconsul urged. Polycarp calmly turned to face the crowd, looked straight at them, and said, "Away with the atheists." The proconsul continued to plead with him. When he asked Polycarp to swear by Caesar to save himself, Polycarp answered, "If you imagine that I will swear by Caesar, you do not know who I am. Let me tell you plainly, I am a Christian." Finally, when all else failed the proconsul reminded Polycarp that he would be thrown to the wild animals unless he changed his mind. Polycarp answered, "Change of mind from better to worse is not a change allowed to us."

Because of Polycarp's lack of fear, the proconsul told him he would be burned alive but Polycarp knew that the fire that burned for an hour was better than eternal fire.

When he was tied up to be burned, Polycarp prayed, "Lord God Almighty, Father of your beloved and blessed Son Jesus Christ, through whom we have received knowledge of you, God of angels and powers, of the whole creation and of the whole race of the righteous who live in your sight, I bless you, for having made me worthy of this day and hour, I bless you, because I may have a part, along with the martyrs, in the chalice of your Christ, to resurrection in eternal life, resurrection both of soul and body in the incorruptibility of the Holy Spirit. May I be received today, as a rich and acceptable sacrifice, among those who are in your presence, as you have prepared and foretold and fulfilled, God who is faithful and true. For this and for all benefits I praise you, I bless you, I glorify you, through the eternal and heavenly High Priest, Jesus Christ, your beloved Son, through whom be to you with him and the Holy Spirit be glory, now and for all the ages to come. Amen."

The fire was lit as Polycarp said Amen and then the eyewitnesses who reported said they saw a miracle. The fire burst up in an arch around Polycarp, the flames surrounding him like sails, and instead of being burned he seemed to glow like bread baking, or gold being melted in a furnace. When the captors saw he wasn't being burned, they stabbed him. The blood that flowed put the fire out.

The proconsul wouldn't let the Christians have the body because he was afraid they would worship Polycarp. The witnesses reported this with scorn for the lack of understanding of Christian faith: "They did not know that we can never abandon the innocent Christ who suffered on behalf of sinners for the salvation of those in this world." After the body was burned, they stole the bones in order to celebrate the memory of his martyrdom and prepare others for persecution.

Can anyone practice contemplative prayer?

Is contemplative prayer just for monks and other religious people, or can anyone practice it?

Saint Teresa of Ávila, a great mystical saint and doctor of the Church, said, "Mental prayer is nothing else, in my opinion, but being on terms of friendship with God, frequently conversing in secret with Him who, we know, loves us" (The Life of St. Teresa of Ávila, chapter VIII). By no means is contemplative prayer reserved only for professional religious men and women. Rather, it's open to all people from all walks of life. While we each may have our own individual and/or family prayer habits and preferences, I can think of no better practice for this Lenten season.

Contemplative prayer differs from other forms of meditative prayer because of its intensity, but like all forms of prayer and meditation, in it we seek the person and presence of Jesus. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, "Contemplative prayer is the simple expression of the mystery of prayer. It is a gaze of faith fixed on Jesus, an attentiveness to the Word of God, a silent love. It achieves real union with the prayer of Christ to the extent that it makes us share in his mystery" (CCC 2724).

If you need help getting started, approach your pastor, spiritual director, or another Catholic minister who is familiar with meditative prayer. He or she can guide you and/or direct you to the best resources available.
