Acts 5:27-32, 40B-41

There's a saying in AA: "Doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results is the definition of insanity." Why keep beating your head against the wall? Sometimes, you just have to give up and move on.

That's exactly what Paul and Barnabas do in today's first reading. Paul is on the first of three missionary journeys, landing in Antioch. The largest, oldest Roman colony in southern Turkey, Antioch was economically prosperous and was the city in which the followers of Jesus were first called "Christians." Paul and Barnabas take their seats in the synagogue, prepared to teach about the Lord. Not surprisingly, the Jews don't want to hear what they have to say. They contradict Paul's words with "violent abuse." It's not a problem for Paul.

"Hey, we were obliged to tell you first, but you're rejecting the Word, so, we're out of here," Paul tells them. And, boom. He turns to the Gentiles, who are thrilled. Let me reiterate: they are *thrilled*, and the word of the Lord "continued to spread through the whole region."

Meanwhile, the Jews plot to get rid of their uninvited and unwanted missionaries, and Paul and Barnabas are expelled. Isn't it funny that St. Luke adds, "So, they shook the dust from their feet in protest against them"? It's like saying, "You don't want us? Well, we don't want any trace of you, either." To shake the dust off one's feet meant, in those times, that one had done all that could be done and was no longer responsible for whatever happened next.

Have you ever had a setback in a project you wholeheartedly believed in? When you or your idea was rejected? It's no picnic. When it happens to me, I get depressed and whiny, moping around and acting my real age, which is about ten years old. Then I hear, "You can't do anything about it; you have to let it go," and that is against every fiber of my being. But these first Christian missionaries didn't seem to mind. In fact, they were "filled with joy and the Holy Spirit." They were able to walk away with a clear conscience, knowing they did their best to spread the Gospel.

They were, in fact, doing exactly what Jesus told them to do: "And if any place will not welcome you or listen to you, leave that place and shake the dust off your feet as a testimony against them." (Mark 6:11)

What if they had stayed in that synagogue? Arguing and fussing? It was the conflict that caused the Word to spread much faster than if Paul and Barnabas had stayed in Antioch. Conflict caused change. The obstacles that the Jews threw at them were opportunities.

This week, conflict showed up, and I hated every minute of it. Son #1 had heard enough of my whining and piped up: "You know what? You're going against everything you taught me. What happened to 'Accept the things you cannot change'? Or 'It's not what happens to you, it's how you react to it that matters'? And, 'Don't make decisions based on emotions'?" Wow, I guess he was listening when I shoved all those platitudes in his ears the whole time he was growing up.

Without conflict, there is no change. Without the conflict at Antioch, you and I may still be waiting to hear God's Word. Thank God for conflict.

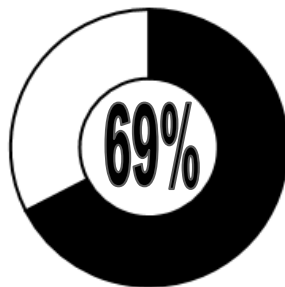

**SAINT OF THE WEEK**  
**St. Anselm**  
**Feast day: April 21**

Indifferent toward religion as a young man, Anselm became one of the Church's greatest theologians and leaders. He received the title "Father of Scholasticism" for his attempt to analyze and illumine the truths of faith through the aid of reason.

At 15, Anselm wanted to enter a monastery, but was refused acceptance because of his father's opposition. Twelve years later, after careless disinterest in religion and years of worldly living, he finally fulfilled his desire to be a monk. He entered the monastery of Bec in Normandy, three years later was elected prior and 15 years later was unanimously chosen abbot.

Considered an original and independent thinker, Anselm was admired for his patience, gentleness and teaching skill. Under his leadership, the abbey of Bec became a monastic school, influential in philosophical and theological studies.

During these years, at the community's request, Anselm began publishing his theological works, comparable to those of St. Augustine (August 28). His best-known work is the book *Cur Deus Homo* ("Why God Became Man").

At 60, against his will, Anselm was appointed archbishop of Canterbury in 1093. His appointment was opposed at first by England's King William Rufus and later accepted. Rufus persistently refused to cooperate with efforts to reform the Church.

Anselm finally went into voluntary exile until Rufus died in 1100. He was then recalled to England by Rufus's brother and successor, Henry I. Disagreeing fearlessly with Henry over the king's insistence on investing England's bishops, Anselm spent another three years in exile in Rome.

His care and concern extended to the very poorest people; he opposed the slave trade. Anselm obtained from the national council at Westminster the passage of a resolution prohibiting the sale of human beings.

"No one will have any other desire in heaven than what God wills; and the desire of one will be the desire of all; and the desire of all and of each one will also be the desire of God" (St. Anselm, Letter 112).

## What do we do with sacramentals?

Is it sacrilegious to throw a sacramental away?

**"Sacramentals do not confer** the grace of the Holy Spirit in the way that the sacraments do, but by the Church's prayer, they prepare us to receive and dispose us to cooperate with it" (CCC 1670).

Therefore, sacramentals confer grace through the Church's power of prayer and, if blessed, should not be thrown away but burned and/ or buried. If the object has not been blessed, it can be discarded; however, it could also be donated to a Catholic ministry (school, prison, hospital, etc.) that would benefit from its distribution. (If a religious object was included in an unsolicited appeal letter from a charitable organization, it is safe to assume that it was not blessed.)

If the object is worn or broken, it should be substantially altered so that it loses its form as a sacramental and then returned to the earthly elements. For example, a worn scapular should be burned and the ashes buried; a damaged statue should be further broken into smaller fragments and buried. A European tradition on the Vigil of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist (June 23) is to burn old sacramentals in bonfires and bury the ashes. Burning and/or burial respects the sacred nature once held by these items and prevents their adaptation for trivial use. Reverence and discretion are proper for whatever method of disposal.
