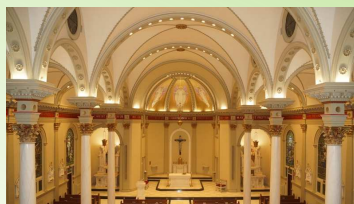

## Up Front with Mary

Luke 7:11-17

As the officer walked up to the car, I fumbled through the glovebox, looking for registration and insurance information. I handed it to him through the window and said, "Rough day."

He answered, "Me, too."

What I wanted to say was, "Oh, you've been sitting at your father's bedside in the rest home, watching him struggle to take his last breaths, too?" But I didn't. I just took the ticket and drove home. There is no mercy to be found in the speed traps of Bridgeport.

Dr. Andy Staron, at last fall's Advent retreat, quoted Fr. James Keenan: "Mercy is the willingness to enter into chaos of another." That cop had no interest in my chaos, even if I had mentioned it.

Cut to Jesus in today's Gospel. He is on his way to Nain and sees a funeral procession. The large crowd is mourning with a widow who lost her only son. "When the Lord saw her, he was moved with pity for her and said to her, 'Do not weep.'" Then he brings the young man back to life.

St. Luke is the only one of the Gospel writers to include this story. The woman didn't ask for this amazing miracle. Death was common in the ancient world. A day didn't go by without funeral processions like this one. Jesus could have raised any number of people from the dead, but he chose this boy.

The verse says Jesus was "moved with pity." Translated literally, the words used in this passage mean "felt it in the guts." Jesus didn't just see a funeral passing by. He must have seen the despair in the mother. He must have known she would end up homeless, penniless, alone. He saw into her heart and decided to "enter into the chaos of another." It wasn't too much for him.

Why is this story included in the Gospel? The miracle in and of itself is beyond belief, but so are all of the miracles that Jesus performed. The blind can see. The deaf can hear. Demons are expelled. Why this story?

Because St. Luke wants to show us that our God is a God of mercy. He saw a sad woman. He felt pity. He acted out of love.

Three steps: Notice. Feel. Act. That's how we show mercy.

Let's start with "act." I can give you the corporal works of mercy (feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned, and bury the dead) or the spiritual works of mercy (instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, admonish sinners, bear wrongs patiently, forgive offenses willingly, comfort the afflicted, and pray for the living and the dead). These can show you how to "act."

But I can't tell you to notice. Or how to feel. It's called compassion, putting ourselves in another's shoes, being with another on an emotional and personal level. Jesus did that when he lived on the same earth as we do, facing the same temptations we do, suffering and dying on the cross in our place.

Dr. Lisa Klewicki tells of a study in which a person was placed in an FMRI (Functional magnetic resonance imaging) machine, given a shock, and then asked to register his pain level. When the person was alone, the pain level was high. When the person held the hand of a stranger, the pain level went down slightly. When the person held the hand of a loved one, the pain was significantly lower, even though the person received the same level of shock all three times. This shows how compassion and love can decrease physical pain. If compassion can decrease felt physical pain, it can also decrease felt emotional pain.

Let's take time this week to notice, to feel, and to act as Jesus did. Enter into the chaos of another. Show mercy.

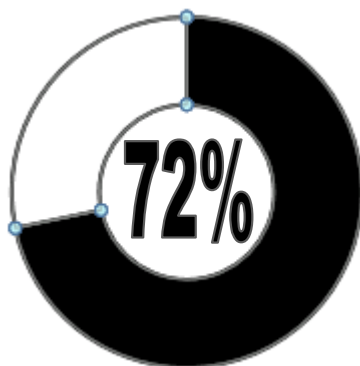

## Ten Commandments for Welcoming a New Priest

IV. Thou shalt not commit gossip. Thou shalt adjust thy attitudes and lighten up, for everything shall be alright.

V. Thou shalt not commit nostalgia or say that the old days were better, for in so doing thou shalt make thy judgement come true.

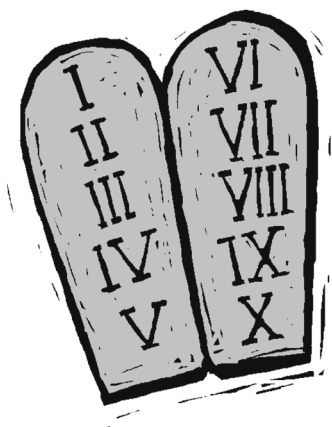
VI. Thou shalt not create "us-them" divisions, but thou shalt unify with thy brothers and sisters even when they annoy or confuse you.

VII. Thou shalt not come to the new priest with your demands, pressure, complaints, bad reports, manipulations, threats, agendas, unsolicited advice, or snide comments. But thou shalt say, "Welcome! How can we help you? We're praying for you. Welcome to our community."

VIII. Thou shalt increase thy giving.

IX. Thou shalt not come to thine old and former priest with anything but praise for the new priest, but thou mayest bring thy concerns to God in humble prayer.

X. Most important, thou shalt trust God, and stay connected to God, and draw strength from God, staying deeply rooted in the message of God's grace. For God is good, and God will never leave you nor forsake you. You can count on that for sure.

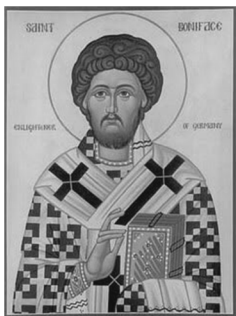

**SAINT OF THE WEEK**  
**St. Boniface of Mainz (Winfrith)**  
**Feastday: June 5**

Born in England about 675, Winfrith convinced his parents to send him to a monastery for schooling because he admired the monks who had visited his home. Through diligent study he rapidly learned all that this local monastery could teach him and was transferred to the monastery at Nursling for further schooling. There he became such a well-known teacher that students circulated notes from his classes.

Back in England he started planning for his second missionary journey. He kept his enthusiasm but directed his zeal into organization and preparation for the journey. He would go to the pagan lands, but first he would travel to Rome. When he had traveled to Friesland he had had no authority to back him up. No one had sent him there, no one would stand up for him if he needed support or help. Now he went to the pope asking for an official mission and the backing of the Church. Pope Gregory II talked to Winfrith all winter long before finally sending him on a test mission to Thuringia in Germany.

In the pope's commission on May 15, 1719, we have the first record of Winfrith's new name, Boniface. The pope apparently gave him this new name because the previous day had been the feast of a martyr by that name. From then on he was known as Boniface to all who knew him.

Missionaries had come to Thuringia before but the Church there was in bad shape, isolated and subject to superstition and heresy. Boniface saw that he was going to get no help from the local clergy and monks, but he had learned in Friesland he could not spread God's word alone. He was about to send for help when he heard that Radbod had died and the missionary Willibrord was back in Friesland. Boniface immediately took off for Friesland, the site of his former humiliation. He was following through on the lesson he had learned at that time and was going to get training from the expert in missions: Willibrord.

In the three years he spent with Willibrord, Boniface gave as much as he gained. Boniface felt the pull of the German missionary work he'd left behind, and, despite Willibrord's pleas, went to Hesse.

Hesse had never been evangelized. Boniface had to start from scratch. Needing even more authority in dealing with chieftains who were his first goal for converts, he appealed to the pope again. During a trip to Rome, the pope consecrated Boniface bishop.

Boniface returned to find that his problems had worsened. People were attracted by Christianity but unable to give up their old religion and superstitions. Knowing that the people needed a reason to let go, Boniface called the tribes to a display of power. As the people watched, Boniface approached the giant oak of Geismar, a sacred tree dedicated to Thor, with an axe. Some of the people must have trembled with each stroke of his axe, but nothing happened. Finally with a crack, the tree split in four parts that we, are told, fell to the ground in the shape of a cross. There stood Boniface, axe in hand, unharmed by their old gods, strong in the power of the one God.

He returned to Thuringia to confront the old problem of the decadent remnants of the Church there. Then Boniface was called upon to lend his own support to Frankish Church which was also sadly in need of reform. He set up councils and synods and instituted reforms which revitalized the Church there.

Few saints retire, and Boniface was no exception. At 73, Boniface headed back to Friesland on a new mission. One day in 754 while he was awaiting some confirmands, an enemy band attacked his camp. Although his companions wanted to fight, Boniface told them to trust in God and to welcome death for the faith. All of them were martyred.

Boniface is known as the Apostle of Germany.

## Sick-call sets make wonderful wedding presents!

I take communion to shut-ins and wonder why, when someone is near death or the priest visits to anoint, a sick-call set is not set up. Decades ago, we all got one as a wedding gift.

When I'm in a parish, I make sure all of my extraordinary ministers take a sick-call (crucifix) set with them because many homes don't have

them. According to the ritual for the Pastoral Care of the Sick (I.III.74), the Eucharist should be transported in a pyx that is kept in a burse. At the location (home), there should be a proper place for the Eucharist, usually a table with a linen cloth, candles, and possibly holy water. All these items are in the set. So, if time and location allow, this should still be done. However, it is not essential if the person is in danger of death or a sacred space cannot be set up (for example, on the side of the road).

These sets are available for purchase; many Catholic supply stores have them. They make a wonderful wedding gift because they recognize that spouses intend to be together until death. The set can be used when one becomes ill or close to death. Unfortunately, many families do not attend Mass, so their preparation for receiving the Eucharist or being anointed is far from their minds. Their awareness of, and access to, such items now come from parish ministers.
