

A Time for New Beginnings

ith the Season Advent, Holy Mother Church enters into a new liturgical year, a new beginning in which the Faithful once again commence the year-long journey through the history of salvation that begins with anticipating the Birth of Our Lord and Savior, drawing us through the Paschal Mystery of His Passion, Death, and Resurrection, and directing us always toward the Second Coming in This holy Season, glory. then, invites us to renew our own commitment to that uni-



versal call to holiness which the Second Vatican Council states is at the root of our baptismal dignity—a call that demands of us a continual process of conversion, of reforming our lives, of renewing our commitment to be disciples of Christ Jesus on a daily basis.

Much the same as with the secular New Year of January 1st, Advent is an excellent time for us to take stock of how we have progressed in our relationship with Jesus Christ over the past year. Have we grown in our prayer life, or has it stayed the same? Has our attendance and participation at Mass become more or less intense? As a pilgrim people, we are called continually to move forward, to draw closer to Christ and to improve steadily in our commitment to live as Children of God and faithful Sons and Daughters of the Church.

As a parish community, this is also an excellent opportunity for us to shake loose the dust of the past year, to broaden our horizons in terms of how we as a parish can grow as a community of Faith, and of how we can become more engaged in our worship of God and in our commitment to serving others.

The bulletin you are holding has been reformatted in order to provide a greater amount of information along with a higher degree of substantive information that I pray will be beneficial to you as a member of this community. It is the main means by

which our parish disseminates information, yes, but it is also a tool through which we ourselves can be re-evangelized and renewed in our desire to take part in the life of our parish community. ## "UpFront" with Mary Hendricks

Such an ominous-sounding Gospel today, huh? The people in Noah's day were living life one minute when the flood swept them away the next minute. People working in the field or at the mill will be taken into heaven, and some will be left behind. "Stay awake!" Jesus warns. "You don't know the day or hour when the Son of Man will return to earth."

Our family has spent an inordinate amount of time together in the car, either for vacations or school/work, and we look forward to and love the long, uninterrupted talks. This Saturday was no different when Son #1 and I drove to Pittsburgh to visit my new great-nephew.

We talked about his dad and how affectionate he was. Harry had no embarrassment about hugging the boys and kissing them when they left the house or telling them he loved them. Because of his father's example, "I always tell people I love them when I leave them," Son #1 emphatically said. "What if you never see them again? I always tell Stephen, 'Love you, bro,' and hug him."

Son # 1 wasn't always like that. Yeah, well, you know how teenaged boys are. They get too big to hug mom or say anything but "Why can't I?" They're moody and mad all the time about...whatever. Hard to tell.

Until he went sailing over the guardrail on I-79 when he was a high school junior.

If you've never had the experience of getting that phone call from the police that your child has been in an accident, you're pretty lucky. It ain't fun. As soon as the officer described what happened and at which mile marker, I was in the car, on the way to the interstate.

Driving his truck home from work, Son #1 decided to close his eyes for a couple of seconds too long. He woke up when the truck drifted onto the berm. He jerked the wheel too hard and lost control. The truck clipped the guardrails as it went over them and flew down a 400-yard embankment, flipping at least three times. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

The driver behind him saw it happen and contacted the police and emergency personnel. Otherwise, it's hard to say when they would have found him, his truck upside down, him on the passenger side. Good thing, because the driver's roof was smashed down to the seat.

I got to the scene, shaking and scared, as the stretcher was going into the ambulance. My firstborn son, the one who taught me the meaning of joy, lifted his head a couple of inches, made eye contact, and said, "Mom, I love you. I love you. I love you, Mom." He couldn't stop saying it.

Later, he told me that the only thing he could think of was, what if he died and hadn't told me he loved me? The boy lost the truck he loved, the one he had paid for by himself,

and a lot of freedom, but his only concern was that my last memory of him wouldn't have been, "I love you, Mom."

As bad as the accident and his losses were, Son #1 sees all of it as a positive experience. It entirely changed the way he wanted to treat the people in his life. He makes it a point to end every conversation, every single conversation, to those he loves with "I love you."

Jesus tells us to be prepared on this First Sunday of Advent. We don't want to hear the worst three words in the English language: "It's too late." We want to hear the three best: "I love you."



## Titurgical Notes

## **A Note on Common Posture**

o kneel or not to kneel: that is the question. Several have made known their observation that a number of our parishioners are no longer standing following the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God). I offer here a brief clarification. In 2003, Bishop Schmitt issued a directive establishing for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston specific common postures within the Mass. This came as a result of the publication of the latest version of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) attached to the Third Edition of the Roman Missal (the one which was fully implemented in 2011). The GIRM instructs that "[t]he faithful kneel after the Agnus Dei unless the Diocesan Bishop determines otherwise" (no. 43). The GIRM further states that to be avoided is any imposition of "private inclination or arbitrary choice." As it has been established in our diocese that the faithful should remain standing, that is what should happen.

All things being equal, however, there is no shortage of variation of this norm in our nation and even within our own diocese. Ultimately, a priest or bishop may give instruction, but it is up to the faithful to determine for themselves that which most effectively "expresses the intentions and spiritual attitude of the participants" (GIRM no. 42). As an act of conscience, an individual may always adopt a posture most conducive to his or her own spiritual well-being, and no ecclesial authority may infringe upon that right. This applies not merely to the sit/stand/kneel of participation at Mass, but applies rather to all aspects of our worship of God, including

whether one receives Holy Communion standing or kneeling, in the hand or on the tongue, etc. The GIRM claims that the Church assigns common postures as a means of seeking to demonstrate the unity of Faith in a visible manner. However, our Catholic liturgical tradition, which spans 2,000 years and a variety of liturgical rites in the West and the East, hinges on a unity of Faith that exists *in spite* of variations in worship, not because of it. Thus, any individual who freely deviates from the norms of posture (which are not a matter of theology but of discipline) as a matter of conscience can no more be seen to be rejecting the Church's authority than if he or she were to dare to kneel and silently pray during the Entrance Hymn or Offertory!

In summation, as the parish priest, I am obliged to inform the faithful of Diocesan norms, but I remain without authority to enforce anything which might impinge upon an individual's conscience or personal piety.

## **Introduction to Advent**

or us Catholics, the new Liturgical Year commences with the first Sunday of Advent. In this new liturgical year, the Church not only wishes to indicate the beginning of a period, but the beginning of a renewed commitment to the faith by all those who follow Christ, the Lord. This time of prayer and path of penance that is so powerful, rich and intense, endeavors to give us a renewed impetus to truly welcome the message of the One who was incarnated for us. In fact, the entire Liturgy of the Advent Season, will spur us to an awakening in our Christian life and will put us in a 'vigilant' disposition, to wait for Our Lord Jesus who is coming:

'Awaken! Remember that God comes! Not yesterday, not tomorrow, but today, now! The one true God, "the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob", is not a God who is there in Heaven, unconcerned with us and our history, but he is the-God-who-comes' (Pope Benedict XVI, Celebration of First Vespers of Advent, Vatican Basilica, December 2006).

The Season of Advent is therefore a season of vigilant waiting, that prepares us to welcome the mystery of the Word Incarnate, who will give the 'Light' to the womb of the Virgin Mary, but essentially this time prepares us not

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only to welcome this great event but to incarnate it in our lives. We could say that the true light enters the world through the immaculate womb of Mary but it does not stay there. On the contrary, this light flows out into our dark, obscure, sinful lives to illuminate them, so that we can become the light that illuminates the world. For this reason, let us live this time of waiting not only to celebrate a historical memory but to repeat this memory in our lives and in the service of others. To wait for the Lord who comes, means to wait and to watch so that the Word of Love enters inside us and focuses us every day of our lives.

As Blessed John Henry Newman reminded us in a homily for the Advent Season: "Advent is a time of waiting, it is a time of joy because the coming of Christ is not only a gift of grace and salvation but it is also a time of commitment because it motivates us to live the present as a time of responsibility and vigilance. This 'vigilance' means the necessity, the urgency of an industrious, living 'wait'. To make all this happen, then we need to wake up, as we are warned by the apostle to the Gentiles, in today's reading to the Romans: 'Besides this you know what hour it is, how it is full time now for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed" (Rm 13:11).

We must start our journey to ascend to the mountain of the Lord, to be illuminated by His Words of peace and to allow Him to indicate the path to tread. (cf. Is 2:1-5). Moreover, we must change our conduct abandoning the works of darkness and put on the 'armor of light' and so seek only to do God's work and to abandon the deeds of the

flesh. (cf. Rm 13:12-14). Jesus, through the story in the parable, outlines the Christian life style that must not be distracted and indifferent but must be vigilant and recognize even the smallest sign of the Lord's coming because we don't know the hour in which He will arrive. (cf. Mt 24:39-44)

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

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
