Our Lady of Fatima

The famous apparitions of the Virgin Mary to the children of Fatima took place during the First World War, in the summer of 1917. The inhabitants of this tiny village in the diocese of Leiria (Portugal) were mostly poor people, many of them small farmers who went out by day to tend their fields and animals. Children traditionally were assigned the task of herding the sheep.

The three children who received the apparitions had been brought up in an atmosphere of genuine piety: Lucia dos Santos (ten years old) and her two younger cousins, Francisco and Jacinta. Together they tended the sheep and, with Lucy in charge, would often pray the Rosary kneeling in the open. In the summer of 1916 an Angel appeared to them several times and taught them a prayer to the Blessed Trinity.

On Sunday, May 13, 1917, toward noon, a flash of lightning drew the attention of the children, and they saw a brilliant figure appearing over the trees of the Cova da Iria. The "Lady" asked them to pray for the conversion of sinners and an end to the war, and to come back every month, on the 13th.

Further apparitions took place on June 13 and July 13. On August 13 the children were prevented by local authorities from going to the Cova da Iria, but they saw the apparition on the 19th. On September 13 the Lady requested recitation of the Rosary for an end to the war. Finally, on October 13, the "Lady" identified herself as "Our Lady of the Rosary" and again called for prayer and penitence.

On that day a celestial phenomenon also took place: the sun seemed to tumble from the sky and crash toward earth. The children had been forewarned of it as early as May 13, the first apparition. The large crowd (estimated at 30,000 by reporters) that had gathered around the children saw the phenomenon and came away astounded.

Official recognition of the "visions" which the children had at the Cova da Iria came on October 13, 1930, when the bishop of Leiria - after long inquiry - authorized the cult of Our Lady of the Rosary at the site. The two younger children had died: Francisco (who saw the apparition but did not hear the words) on April 4, 1919, and his sister Jacinta on February 20, 1920. Sister Lucia died on February 13, 2005, at her Carmelite convent in Coimbra, Portugal, after a long illness.

The Message of Fatima

The public message of Fatima recalls that of Lourdes. Through the children Mary urges prayer for sinners, recitation of the Rosary, and works of penance. On October 13 she said: "I have come to exhort the faithful to change their lives, to avoid grieving Our Lord by sin; to pray the Rosary. I desire in this place a chapel in my honor. If people mend their ways, the war will soon be over."

But Mary also confided several "secrets" to the children, some of which Lucy subsequently transmitted. Presumably there was prediction of another war in the near future and a request for special veneration of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The final secret Lucy is thought to have entrusted to Pope John XXIII.

As at Lourdes, the "apparitions" of Fatima have brought crowds of visitors. Pilgrimages, which began in the summer of 1917, have experienced growing success, not only among the Portuguese themselves but also among people from other countries, including the United States. The national pilgrimage following ecclesiastical recognition of the apparitions (May 13, 1931) is said to have drawn more than a million participants.

Popes have shown exceptional favor toward Fatima, Pius XII, Paul VI, and John Paul II in particular making a visit



to the shrine. The papal interest and the basilica built at the site of the apparitions has helped to swell the summer pilgrimages to Fatima. Crowds comparable to, and sometimes larger than, those at Lourdes are not uncommon. In a rustic setting, pilgrims hear the message repeated that Mary spoke to the children: prayer, works of penance, recourse to her Immaculate Heart.

The 100th Anniversary

For the 100th anniversary of the apparitions of Our Lady of Fatima in Portugal, Pope Francis has decided to grant a plenary indulgence opportunity throughout the entire anniversary year,

UpFront with Mary Hendricks

4th Sunday of Easter, Year A,
May 7, 2017
John 10: 1-10

Let's concentrate on this line from the Gospel about the Good Shepherd: "The sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice."

That's because they are listening.

We tend to think that sheep are dumb. Well, maybe not. There was a study in 2001 that showed that sheep can recognize and remember faces and voices of up to 50 people for two years, longer than most humans can. They form long-term relationships and defend their friends in fights. They appear to be able to feel anger, boredom, happiness, and sadness. They can associate their shepherd's voice with two important benefits: safety and food. So, they become good listeners.

Are we good listeners? President Franklin D. Roosevelt wanted to find out. He got tired of the smiling and the small talk that he endured during White House receptions. Instead of the usual, "How are you?" and "Fine, how are you?" exchange, he decided to mumble, "I murdered my grandmother this morning." No one noticed, and he got replies like, "How lovely!" and "You're doing great work as president." Finally, a foreign diplomat heard what Roosevelt was actually saying. Responding to "I killed my grandmother this morning," the diplomat said, "I'm sure she deserved it, sir."

Any textbook on good conversation will point out that listening is vitally important, while giving tips on effective listening. It requires focus—which I sorely lack. Ask Father or Sandy. They can tell me something, with me looking them straight in the eyes, and I will not hear one word. That's because I'm trying to remember the car is parked or if I have marshmallows in the pantry or how many chucks can a woodchuck chuck if a woodchuck could chuck wood. Seriously, no focus. Many times their answer to my questions is, "I already told you that."

And if they think I'm terrible at listening to them, I'm not even telling them about my conversations with God. They're pretty much one-sided. I talk. He listens. So, how can I hear the shepherd's voice if I'm the only one doing the talking? How will I recognize and follow him if I'm not listening effectively?

If you have this challenge, too, maybe we can figure this out together.

The sheep know the shepherd's voice because they spend so much time together. We can always spend more time with God, like going to Mass more than once a week. If we can't find that time because of work, we have the Scriptures. Oh, but we know those two strategies already!

Here's one that is going to take some dis-

cipline and focus: Eucharistic adoration. It's hard for me to sit still for very long, maybe 20 minutes tops. What if we did 10 minutes of Eucharistic adoration this week? It's available at St. Pat's on Fridays from 9am to noon. Ten minutes? We can do that! We can work our way up to 30 minutes or even an hour, a little bit at a time.

Kneeling before the Eucharist in the quiet church, we can shut off all the noises in our world, our phones, our stresses, and just relax in the Lord's presence. St. Mother Theresa of Calcutta emphasized seeking God in solitude, saying, "We need to find God, and He cannot be found in noise and restlessness. God is the friend of silence. See how nature—trees, flowers, grass—grows in silence; see the stars, the moon and sun, how they move in silence. The more we receive in silent prayer, the more we can give in our active life. We need silence to be able to touch souls. The essential thing is not what we say, but what God says to us and through us. All our words will be useless unless they come from within — words which do not give the light of Christ increase the darkness."

In other words: be quiet and listen.

Only then will we recognize the Shepherd's voice.

Commentary for the Readings in the Extraordinary Form: 3rd Sunday after Easter



A little while and you shall see Me no longer. . .because I go to the Father. . .And you therefore have sorrow now; but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no one shall take from you" (Gospel).

Christianity is a religion of joy! (Introit). May "those . . . in error" receive this "light" (Prayer). Jesus predicts, however, that our joy can never be perfect here. The "cross before the crown" (Alleluia Verse) would indeed be a mystery had no Jesus lived it out for us.

An unbelieving "world shall rejoice" because it regards Him as dead and gone. But Christ departs only for a "little while" (Gospel) to test our love and loyalty. He shall return (as indicated by little figure of Christ in the clouds).

Prepare for His coming "in the day of visitation" by good example. "Behave yourselves honorably among pagans; that they ... observing your good works" for God and country (described in the Epistle) may recognize that Christianity is a religion of joy, now and forever!

which began Nov. 27, 2016, and will end Nov. 26, 2017.

To obtain the plenary indulgence, the faithful must also fulfill the ordinary conditions: go to Confession and Communion, be interiorly detached from sin, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

1. Make a pilgrimage to the shrine

The first way is for “the faithful to make a pilgrimage to the Fatima Shrine in Portugal and participate in a celebration or prayer dedicated to the Virgin.”

In addition, the faithful must pray the Our Father, recite the Creed, and invoke the Mother of God.

2. Pray before any statue of Our Lady of Fatima

The second way applies to “the pious faithful who visit with devotion a statue of Our Lady of Fatima solemnly exposed for public veneration in any church, oratory or proper place during the days of the anniversary of the apparitions, the 13th of each month from May to October (2017), and there devoutly participate in some celebration or prayer in honor of the Virgin Mary.”

Regarding this second way, the rector of the Fatima Shrine told CNA that the visit to the statue of the Virgin, “does not necessarily have to be only at Fatima or exclusively in Portugal,” but can be done anywhere in the world.

Those seeking an indulgence must also pray an Our Father, recite the Creed and invoke Our Lady of Fatima.

3. The elderly and infirm

The third way to obtain a plenary indulgence applies to people who, because of age, illness or other serious cause, are unable to get around.

These individuals can pray in front of a statue of Our Lady of Fatima and must spiritually unite themselves to the jubilee celebrations on the days of the apparitions, the 13th of each month, between May and October 2017.

They also must “offer to merciful God with confidence, through Mary, their prayers and sufferings or the sacrifices they make in their own lives.”

Accomplishments:

Growing Enrollment : This year we celebrated another year of growing enrollment. We serve students from Lewis, Upshur, Gilmer and Braxton counties. Our faculty and staff is committed to offering a Catholic education to all students.
