"The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field, which a person finds and hides again, and out of joy goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price, he goes and sells all that he has and buys it" (Matt 13:44-46).

> he lesson of these two parables is as true for us today, as it was for those Pal-

estinians to whom Christ spoke. All Christians are called on to imitate the two wise men, and surrender all their earthly possessions if necessary in order to gain eternal life. Does this "giving all" mean that we are all expected to abandon the world and take on the religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience? There are many who do just this. But it is not the only way, nor the normal way, to purchase the eternal treasure. Heaven is within the reach of all, who follow the ordinary vocations of life and partake of this world's joys and pleasures within the framework of God's commandments, but never lose sight of the goal toward which they are moving.

Keeping within the framework of God's commandments is the difficulty. We need not have a vow of obedience, but we must obey all legitimate authority. We may possess the goods of this world, but only such goods as we lawfully and justly acquire. Nor may we withhold all of these from a fellow man who is in need. We do not have to take a vow of chastity, but yet we must be chaste, we must use the gifts and the pleasure of sex only within the limits set down by God's wise laws.

All of this is not easy for human nature. But we are not relying on weak human nature, we have within our reach in the Church all the spiritual and supernatural aids we need. Our twentieth century, it is true, is so engrossed in chasing after the earthly comforts and pleasures of the body, and so devoid of any spiritual or other-worldly outlook, that even those who know and believe that there is an eternity after death, find it hard to allow their faith and convictions to govern and direct their daily actions. Yet, the evil example of others will never justify our wrong-doing. The commandments of God are still binding, even though they are openly and flagrantly violated by individuals and whole nations today.

Diaper Drive for Diaper Need

What is Diaper Need?

*DIAPER NEED IS THE STRUGGLE **TO PROVIDE BABIES** WITH CLEAN, DRY DIAPERS.

1 in **3** families in America struggles to afford diapers for their children.

Diapers cost \$18 per week, or \$936 per year, on average per child; Babies need 6-10 diapers a day.

An inadequate supply of diapers forces many parents to leave their child in a soiled diaper longer than is appropriate, which frequently leads to diaper rash, and may cause staph infections and urinary tract infections.

We will be collecting diapers after Mass on Aug. 5-6, and Aug. 12-13. A collection box will be in the vestibule. These diapers will be taken to the FRN and given to those in need. Sizes 3, 4, and 5, are in high demand, but ALL sizes are appreciated.

Kids' Corner Catechesis

St. Peter Chrysologus Feast Day: July 30 Born: 406 - Died: 450

Peter was born in the small town of Imola in Italy. He studied under the guidance of Bishop Cornelius of Imola and was converted to Christianity. When he was ready, he was ordained as a deacon. Even as a boy, Peter understood that a person is truly great only if he can control his passions and put on the spirit of Christ.

In 433, when the archbishop of Ravenna, Italy, died, Pope St. Leo the Great appointed Peter to take his pace. St. Peter did a very good job as a priest and bishop. He worked hard to get rid of the belief in false gods and false teachings that were still practiced by some pagans in his diocese. And he helped his people grow in faith.

St. Peter soon became a very famous preacher and he was given the name "Chrysologus" which means "golden word." His sermons or homilies were all short. He was afraid his audience would get bored. These sermons were not especially unusual but his beautiful explanations of the Incarnation, the Creed, the place of Mary and John the Baptist in the great plan of salvation etc. led him to be named Doctor of the Church.

His messages were more valuable than gold. He preached with such enthusiasm and fire that people listened to him breathlessly. In his sermons, St. Peter urged everyone to receive Jesus often in Holy Communion. He wanted people to understand that the Body of Christ should be the daily food for their souls.

This good archbishop also worked for the unity of all the members of the Catholic Church. He kept the peace by helping people understand what Catholics believe. St. Peter Chrysologus died on December 2, 450, in his hometown of Imola, Italy.

Reflection: We pray today that our hearts may always be open to listen to and understand the Word of God.

Pastoral Notes & Ramblings

<u>Semper Reformanda,</u> <u>Semper Renovanda</u>

The "dog days" of summer are completely upon us as we approach the middle of the season. Temperatures seem to vary between 'miserably hot' and 'completely unbearable.' Of course, when we think that six months from now we will probably be begging God for a day above freezing, I suppose it is inappropriate to dwell too long on the current heat. After all, as I often tell people: Better to roast in this life than in the next!

It seems that our summer seasons get shorter and shorter every year. Vacations get curtailed, school starts earlier, and what should be a time for relaxation and refreshment for most instead turns into a season of rushing around and exhausting ourselves. I wish I could say that we have at least slowed down here on the parish level, but that is far from true.

During the Second Vatican Council, a phrase was often heard: *ecclesia semper reformanda, semper renovanda* (a Church always reforming, always being renewed). It is a phrase that I find myself continually muttering to myself as I encounter stagnation and hesitation in various aspects of parish life—and even within myself! As the pilgrim Church, we never stop—we are always progressing. So, too, it is with the life of a parish, which never really takes a break. Sure, there are times of the year that are busier than others, but the work of salvation never stops.

This summer has been inordinately busy, as we have taken to making a number of improvements around the property, especially in the old Convent building. Most who pass through our parish offices have seen the tired state of this building that, for many years, was home to our beloved Sisters of Saint Joseph. It is amazing to see what a few carpet squares and some fresh paint can do to a place! Along with giving our offices a bit of a cosmetic facelift, we have also been working hard at organizing our storage spaces, making room for better organized archives and record-keeping, and we are in the beginning stages of assembling a parish resource library, which will be available to all for research, reference, and general self-catechesis.

Ultimately, what may seem to be cosmetic or organizational is fundamental to the life of a parish. Our menial works are less a matter of taste and more the manifestation of a deeply-held philosophy that the care we give in this life will bear fruit in the next. Just as we are motivated to acts of charity and kindness for the sake of growing in virtue, so, too, must we be inspired by that spirit of reform and renewal within ourselves and within our parish as a way of combatting the decay of stagnation and sterility that serves neither to inspire nor to invite.

It may seem, at first glance, that fresh

coats of paint and shelving units have little to do with salvation. Perhaps that is so. Or so it seems. Over the past year much has been written in our bulletin about the nature of stewardship. Christian Stewardship is a life-style which acknowledges accountability and responsibility before God. Becoming a Steward begins when we say we believe in God, to whom we give our love, loyalty and trust. We affirm that every aspect of our lives comes as a gift from Him. Stewards are motivated as recipients of God's abundant love, to respond by participating and supporting His plan of salvation and the ministries of the Church, which make salvation possible for them and for others. In the Bible, the Steward is depicted as a person who is given the responsibility of managing something that belongs to the Owner,

As God has been generous to us, He expects us to be generous toward the work of Christ and His Church. Our Stewardship Commitment is the tool of ministry, salvation and healing for us and for others. Christian Stewardship is the privilege and honor of directly supporting God's work on earth through the Church. Sometimes, however, that work is of a more mundane nature-painting, cleaning, etc. But those works are no less important than the Sacramental life of the parish, through which people are offered the means to Salvation. True stewardship can be compared to a river, which overflows into many tributaries and reaches out in many directions to share with others our rich and profound spiritual inheritance.
