"Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets, and stone them that are sent to you, how often would I have gathered together your children, as the hen does her chickens under her wings, and you would not" (Mt. 23:37)? "God created us without our cooperation," says St. Augustine. "but he cannot

who rejected the invitation. The king may come in at any moment and cast out those who are not properly dressed. Being a member of the Church on earth is a wonderful privilege, and a sure guarantee that we will reach heaven, if we do what is expected of us. But the same obstacles which prevented the Pharisees from entering the kingdom-love of this world, its wealth and its pleasures-can impede us too, unless we are on our guard. The world with its allurements is very close to us; heaven seems very far away. Thus we must be prepared to do violence to our ordinary inclinations, to go against them when-

save us unless we cooperate." We too could make the Pharisees' mistake. We have the invitation to the wedding feast; in fact, we are already in the banquet hall, since our baptism; but are we wearing the wedding garment of virtue and grace? If not,

ever and wherever "the things that are Caesar's" tend to blot out or make us forget "the things that are God's."

This implies a daily carrying of the cross, a daily struggle against our evil inclinations, a daily endeavor to acquire true love of God and neighbor. This

may sound superhuman, but Christ did not ask anyone to do the impossible. He led the way, and millions have followed him to eternal glory. He has called us too and has placed within our easy reach in his Church all the grace we need. If we fail to use these divine helps, if we are found without the wedding garment, we will have no one to blame

but ourselves. We have been called with the many. We can be among the "chosen."

The parish office will be closed Tuesday, Oct. 17 through Thursday, Oct. 19. Parish staff will be attending a conference in Charleston. We will not have Mass on these days. The parish office will be open and we will have daily Mass on Fri. Oct. 20.

Special Collection Oct. 28 and 29

In response to the critical need of our brothers and sisters in Christ of the Diocese of St. Thomas—U.S. Virgin Islands following hurricanes Irma and Maria, Most Rev. Michael J. Bransfield, bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has asked for each parish in the diocese to conduct a special collection Oct. 28 and 29 to assist in the relief efforts.

The diocese was hit by two catastrophic hurricanes during September. All of the U.S. Virgin Islands felt the effects of both hurricanes-Hurricane Irma hit St. Thomas, St. John and Water Island while Hurricane Maria hit St. Croix. The area is still suffering from power outages and lack of communication as well as complete destruction in many areas.

Special envelopes have been provided to your parish to make the giving process easier. Checks for the relief fund should be made out to your respective parish with "Second Collection St. Thomas-US Virgin Islands" on the memo line.

"As we continue our prayers for the victims and first responders following these unprecedented events," Bishop Bransfield said, "let us also spend time in prayer and discernment as we prepare for this upcoming collection. The wonderful generosity of the faithful of our diocese is a beautiful testament of our commitment to living out the values of Christ."

St. Teresa of Avila Feast Day: October 815 Born: 1515 Died: 1582

Teresa was born in Avila in Spain. As a little

girl in her parents' rich home, Teresa and her

brother Rodrigo loved to read the lives of the

saints and martyrs. They felt that the martyrs got to heaven an easy way.

The two children set out secretly to go to the land of the Moors. As they walked along, they prayed that they might die for Christ. But they had not gotten far when they met an uncle. He took them back to their worried mother at once.

Next the children decided to be hermits in their garden. This didn't work out either. They could not get enough stones together to build their huts.

St. Teresa herself wrote down these amusing stories of her childhood. But when she grew to be a teenager, however, she changed. Teresa read so many novels and foolish romances that she lost much of her love for prayer.

She began to think more of dressing up to look pretty. But after she ecovered from a bad illness, Teresa read a book about the great St. lerome.

Then and there, she made up her mind to become a bride of Christ. As a nun, Teresa often found it hard to pray. Besides that, she had poor health and also wasted time every day in long, foolish conversations.

But one day, in front of a picture of Jesus, Teresa felt great sorrow that she did not love God more. She started then to live for Jesus alone, no matter what sacrifice had to be made.

In return for her love, the Lord gave St. Teresa the privilege of hearing him talk to her. She also began to see visions and Jesuit and Dominican priests came to see if this was true. They were convinced and declared that the visions were holy and true.

She learned to pray in a marvelous way, too. St. Teresa of Avila is famous for having opened new Carmelite convents. These convents were filled with sisters who wanted to live holy lives.

They made many sacrifices for Jesus with Teresa herself giving them the example. She praved with great love and worked hard at her duties in the convent.

St. Teresa was a great leader and true lover of Jesus and his Church. She died in 1582.

St. Teresa taught that we must have a great trust in God's care for us. She wrote that a person who has God, will need nothing; God alone is enough.

People are always looking for a miracle but what if you could be that miracle for someone. This is something that I never thought about until I was put into this position. My life hangs in the balance of somebody else. You probably are asking who is this person? My name is Anita Droppleman. I am a mother and grandmother and a parishioner of St. Patrick Church. About 4years ago I was diagnosed with non alcoholic liver disease which effects 30 million people, one in every million. I need a liver transplant. People do not know that the transplant can be from a living person. Surgeons will take a piece of a healthy liver from someone and transplant that piece. The liver is an amazing organ that will rejuvenate in about four to six weeks! I'm currently on a list for a donor but as of yet haven't gotten a match. A great friend of family has been tested but we haven't heard if she is a match. If she isn't, I will be having another surgery very soon in Pittsburg at UPMC. If she is not a match and you would like to be tested please go to: http://www.upmc.com/services/ transplant/Pages/default.aspx. You cannot be over the age of 55 (my age), must be in relatively good health and willing to give up time and a part of themselves without expecting anything in return. Except the gratitude and respect of the person receiving the donation. My blood type is A positive which can be matched to other blood types. Thank you for keeping me and my family in your thoughts and prayers.
