The second reading is from the first Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians 2:7b-9, 13. St. Paul is especially grateful that the Thessalonians received the word as from God, not men. The preacher of the word of God is well aware of his responsibility in proclaiming and preaching that word for he asks in the prayer before the gospel that the Lord will cleanse his heart and lips as he did Isaiah's for he is aware that it is God's word that is to be preached, not his own, or on his own terms. —



Kids' Corner Catechesis

St. Bertilla

Feast Day: November 5

When she was just a teenager, she felt the call to grow closer to God. She realized that if she joined a monastery, she could lead the life of prayer and sacrifice that she wanted.

She went to her bishop, St. Ouen, and asked his advice. He encouraged her to follow her calling. So her parents sent her to a monastery of nuns who followed the rule of an Irish monk, St. Columban.

When she arrived, she knew that she had found peace. Years passed and Bertilla spent her time praying and doing different tasks. She was very good at offering hospitality to travelers and the sick who came to the monastery. She also cared for the children who were being educated at the monastery.

St. Bathildis, the queen and wife of King Clovis II, started a new monastery. She asked the abbess at Soissons to send some nuns to begin the community.

Bertilla was among those chosen and she was appointed the abbess. She was very surprised, but decided to do the best she could. She knew that the Lord would help her in every way and the community of nuns grew.

Queen Bathildis herself became a nun after her husband died. Then, another queen, Hereswitha, widow of the king of the East Angles, became a nun, too.

Abbess Bertilla must have been amazed to have two queens in her community. But everyone lived in peace because the queens were as humble as St. Bertilla.

Bertilla lived a long life and ruled the monastery of Chelles for forty-six years. Her heart was open and ready to follow wherever the Spirit led her. She died around the year 705.

Parish Membership & Benefits:

To be considered an "active" member of the parish (and thus eligible for Sacraments, sponsor eligibility, and the "Catholic tuition" rate at St. Patrick's School), the parish takes into account family & individual involvement in parish life and ministries, and Mass attendance. Catholic Sharing Appeal and HVAC Installation Update

Thank you to everyone how has given to the 2017 campaign for the Catholic Sharing Appeal. We raised, \$84,990.00 and surpassed our goal of \$19,180.00 by 443%!!! How awesome is that? Our portion of the money raised through the Catholic Sharing Appeal is being used for the replacement of the gym boiler. The new system, an HVAC system, will be more economical as heat ducts will be placed through-out the building instead of just the gymnasium area as it is now. The addition of air conditioning will enable the use of the gym in the summer months.

The installation has begun. Childers Enterprises of Beckley and King Electric of Weston are working on the project.

We ask for your prayers that everything go according to schedule and for the safety of those doing the work.

New Parish Phone System

Some of you may have noticed a change that took place to the parish's phone service over the summer. While our direct number has not changed (304-269-3048), some other adjustments have been made in order to help us better serve our parishioners.

The number 304-269-1244 is now a dedicated FAX line.

When you call 269-3048, you'll be instructed to Press 9 in order to complete the call. This minor inconvenience is set up to keep our phone lines free of spam and robocalls, and will rout you through to one of our volunteer receptionists or to Sandy's office if no receptionist is available.

When the office is closed, you will be directed to a series of options in order to make sure that you get connected to the right person. The options to reach Sandy and Fr. DeViese will put you through to their office lines. But if the office is closed, they may not be in the office to answer. The most important option here is for Sacramental Emergencies.

If you Press 7, your call will be directly routed to either Fr. DeViese or to another on-call priest. This option is available so that parishioners who are dying, are being taken to the hospital or otherwise have an emergency that requires a priest for absolution, Anointing of the Sick, or Last Rites. Please use this option if you or your loved one are to be hospitalized or are dying! Father is both able and willing to provide Sacramental ministry to those who require it.
