

#### Irish Porter Cake

This fruit cake is made with the famous black stout of Ireland. Its distinctive flavour makes it a great favorite-so much so that it is even exported in tins to Irish | • 8 oz or 1 cup butter emigrants in the United States. This cake  $\diamond$  8 oz or 1 cup plus 2 is suitable for St. Patrick's Day, but then leftovers can be saved until after Easter.

#### DIRECTIONS

- ♦ Preheat oven to 350°F.
- Melt the butter and the sugar in a saucepan with the stout. Add the orange zest  $\blacklozenge$  zest of 1 orange and all the fruit except the cherries. | • 8 oz or 1 cup sultan-Bring to a boil and boil for 3-4 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and allow to cool until lukewarm.
- Sieve the flour, soda and spice into a mixing bowl. Add the fruit mixture to the flour and then add the cherries. Whisk the eggs and add gradually, mixing well.
- Spoon the mixture into a greased and floured 9 inch round pan and bake in the middle of a preheated 350°F oven for about 1 1/2 hours.
- If you wish you may pour 4 tablespoons of stout over the cake when it is cooked (prick the cake with a skewer first). Keep for 1 to 4 days before cutting. This cake will keep well for several weeks in a tin.

#### INGREDIENTS

- Tablespoons brown sugar or golden bakers' sugar
- ◆ 1/2 pint or 1 1/4 cups stout, Guinness or Murphy
- as or golden raisins
- ♦ 8 oz or 1 cups raisins
- ◆ 4 oz or 1/2 cup mixed peel
- ♦ 1 lb or 4 cups unbleached all purpose flour
- ◆ 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ◆ 2 teaspoons mixed spice
- ◆ 4 oz or 1/2 cup glacé cherries, halved
- ♦ 3 eggs

Yield: 1, 9-inch cake
