#### You can never know too much about our faith!

This week's spotlight: RCIA Topic: The Eucharist By Megan White

This week in RCIA we are covering the Eucharist. Every Catholic knows about the Eucharist– or at least, most of us think we do. We are familiar with the teachings that the Eucharist is the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Christ and we are quick to get into the communion line. But do we believe? Or at least do we believe in the power of the Eucharist as much as satanists? Allow me to explain.

"These people knew the value of the sacraments!" says Betty Brennan, a former satanist. She states that every satanic ritual is a takeoff of the sacramental rites of the Roman Catholic Church and calls this a testimony to their power. She claims that a skilled witch could identify a consecrated host among thousands of unconsecrated ones. In a youtube audio (url below), she speaks of how when she attended Mass as a practicing satanist she always had to leave before the consecration, terrified and breaking out in a sweat.

Why am I talking about this? Because satanists seem more convinced of the Blessed Sacrament than Catholics do. We find it difficult to drag ourselves to the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Mass; only a handful of familiar faces attend daily Mass, we stay far from confession and are quick to jump in line to receive communion only to run out the door at the final hymn.

The statistics are terrifying but not shocking. A recent survey by PewResearch presents that only a third of Catholics believe in transubstantiation– the official church teaching that the substance of ordinary bread and wine are transformed into the body and blood of our Lord during the consecration at Mass. No wonder the United States Council of Catholic Bishops has called for a national Eucharistic revival!

The Eucharist is the sign of the new and eternal covenant established by Jesus Christ. The reception of Holy Communion-- in a state of grace- is how we become partakers in the covenant promise of eternal life. It is the "source and the summit" of our faith as the catechism puts it- both the end goal and the means to that goal. The Eucharist is Jesus present with us.

For more info on what constitutes a mortal sin, refer to the Catechism of the Catholic Church 1857 - 1859.</li> <li>If you have not observed the Eucharistic Fast one hour before receiving. Mints and gum break your fast.</li> <li>If you have not yet received First Communion.</li> <li>Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Holy Communion? Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are not admitted to Holy Communion.</li> <li>For those who cannot receive Eucharist at this time, we welcome you to join in our liturgy, to pray and sing with us. Please remain in the pew during the Communion Procession, offering your heartfelt prayers to our God of love and mercy. We eagerly await the time when you will join us at the Eucharistic table!</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Mass Etiquette</li> <li>Please remember to silence or turn off your cell phones prior to the start of Mass. Tablets and other gaming devices should not be brought to church.</li> <li>When we are in the church, we should refrain from speaking in order to allow for people to pray. If we talk, we should keep our volume to a reverential whisper. This is not because we don't want community. This is to promote prayer with Christ in the Eucharist and to prepare our hearts and minds for Mass. Community time is best for after Mass in the vestibule or outside the church.</li> <li>Other people use your pew. Pease take all bulletins, papers, tissues, etc. with you when you leave.
