This week's spotlight: RCIA

Topic: Love & God's Plan for Sexuality

Fatima visionary Lucia Santos revealed to Cardinal Carlo Caffarra in 1983-1984 that "...a time will come when the decisive battle between the kingdom of Christ and Satan will be over marriage and the family." Most of us have witnessed this cosmic battle over marriage and are quick to blurt out the obvious sins against marriage within the world: abortion, homosexuality, pornography, premarital sex, and cohabitation. Yet, one sin against marriage lurks within Christ's Church that we are all too silent about: contraception. Contraception is "any action which, either in anticipation of the conjugal act [sexual intercourse], or in its accomplishment, or in the development of its natural consequences, proposes, whether as an end or as a means, to render procreation impossible" (Humanae Vitae 14). This includes sterilization (vasectomy, tubal ligation), condoms and other barrier methods, spermicides, coitus interruptus (withdrawal method), the Pill, etc.

Many, unfortunately, believe that there are certain aspects of Church teaching in which we can choose to disagree with, claiming that they are outdated. Certainly, our Lord cares much about morality, particularly in regards to the family as "The well being of the individual person and of both human and Christian society is closely bound up with the healthy state of conjugal and family life." [CCC, 1603]

Contraception boils down to love versus use. Contraception makes the marital embrace a recreational activity and not a way that spouses renew their marital vows physically; it should be: total, free, loving, faithful, and fruitful. Contraception in marriage says "You are an object for my pleasure," where sex should otherwise say, "I am yours, completely. I am holding nothing back from you." We should never look at our spouse as an object for pleasure nor reject any part of them, including the gift of their fertility. True love is not sterile. We know that marriage is a reflection of God's love for us- and imagine if that love was sterile! Imagine if God held himself back from his people instead of fruitfully conceiving love within us. Out of the loving embrace of a husband and wife a child is begotten in the image of that love— this is nothing short of a miracle. It is no wonder the devil wants to attack such a gift- the miracle of life. Satan tempts us with selfishness as a friend once said to me, "The world is so selfish because there are no babies in families!" We make many excuses to not have more children but it is ironic to me that in one of the wealthiest nations in the world and during a time where humans have more than ever in the past there are less children in families. This is even more appalling to see among Catholics who have given into such a worldly mindset.

With this being said, Catholics are also called to responsible parenthood. Just because we are not to use contraception does not mean that we do not have the ability to limit our family size when that is the most responsible decision for our family (as in times of sickness, pregnancy spacing, or economic distress). In this case, families are called to utilize the gift of Natural Family Planning (NFP). NFP refers to a couple being aware of days during a woman's cycle where she is naturally fertile (approximately 5-7 days) and choosing to practice chastity during this time. NFP is a beautiful way for Catholics to cooperate with the way God designed the female body as opposed to artificial birth control methods that cause a woman's body to work completely against its design. Imagine taking a medication the prevented your legs from moving— absurd, right? This is what most birth control pills do— prevent ovulation— a natural and necessary design of the female body. It is not loving to tell a woman she should change her body to be an object for pleasure.

St. Pats is the first church in our diocese to offer Catechesis of the Good Shepherd but we won't be the last. Other parishes have already reached out to talk with Kait about getting the program in their parish. If your child is age 3—6, we urge you to check out this program. You will not be disappointed.

The CGS Approach

We believe that God and the child have a unique relationship with one another, particularly before the age of six; that growth of this relationship should be assisted by the adult, but is directed by the Spirit of God; that children need their own place to foster the growth of that relationship; and that the child's spiritual growth is best served through tangible but indirect means.

CGS is a common religious experience involving children and adults in which the religious values of childhood, primarily those values of contemplation and enjoyment of God, are predominant. This experience is shared in a place particularly prepared for the religious life of children called the Atrium.

Is the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Catholic?

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd came about through the work of two Roman Catholic laywomen in Rome: Sofia Cavalletti and Gianna Gobbi. They were inspired by the educational principles of Maria Montessori, also a Catholic. The materials they prepared for children, since 1954, were based on the Bible, the Roman Catholic liturgy and sacraments, Tradition, and Church teachings. In 1985, a Level I course welcomed participants from both Catholic and several other Christian traditions. Since that time, the ecumenical character of the roster for each course has continued. All presentations are offered as given to us by Sofia and Gianna (Catholic) and participants are welcome to adapt them to their own traditions with the encouragement of the national association and help from CGS formation leaders who share their traditions.

Why is Mass Offered for Specific People?

The greatest prayer that we have as Christians is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. At each Mass, Christ's Sacrifice on Calvary is renewed and the graces achieved on the Cross are applied to souls for their salvation. This is why we have Masses offered for particular intentions.

Sanctuary Candle Intentions

The red Sanctuary Lamp by the tabernacle burns to remind us of the Eucharistic presence of Jesus Christ. It is a mark of honor to remind the faithful of the Real Presence of Christ, and is a profession of their love and affection for our Lord. If you wish to have the Sanctuary Lamp burning in memory or honor of a loved one, or to honor a special occasion, please contact the parish office. The cost of the candle is \$20.00. It will burn for two weeks. The memorial will also be published in the Bulletin.

Ash Wednesday Special Collection

On February 6, a 7.8 earthquake magnitude devastated large areas of southern Turkey northwest Syria. The death toll has surpassed 20,000 and continues to climb. Thousands of people have been injured and many are trapped beneath the rubble. The earthquake is the worst to strike Turkey this century. Within the subsequent 24 hours, the region experienced multiple aftershocks and a second 7.5 magnitude quake.



Across affected areas, apartment buildings and schools have been leveled. Telecommunications are disrupted, preventing families from identifying and accounting for missing loved ones. In Syria, displaced people are seeking shelter in schools and community centers in areas already devastated by years of war. Across southern Turkey, schools are closed, airport transportation is impaired and hospitals have been declared unusable.

Catholic Relief Services is supporting local partners in their efforts to provide urgent relief and assistance for long-term recovery. CRS has partnerships with Caritas Turkey and Caritas Syria, as well as other local partners. To support the efforts of these organizations, Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held on Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023, and for collection baskets to remain available for the collection through the first Sunday of Lent. Bishop Brennan appreciates your generosity this past summer to those affected by the severe storms and flooding in Eastern Kentucky and Southern West Virginia. But he feels impelled once again to ask you to do what you can to help those affected by this most recent disaster.

All funds collected in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will be given to Catholic Relief Services with the special designation for use in the Turkey/Syria Earthquake Recovery Effort.

Candlemas, February 2



St. Blaise Day, February 3

Many Catholics have their throats blessed on the Feb. 3 feast of St. Blaise or during one of the weekend Masses near the feast. But how many know who St. Blaise was and why he is associated with protection against ailments of the throat?

Five facts about St. Blaise:

- 1. Before becoming a fourth-century bishop of Sebaste in Armenia, St. Blaise was a physician.
- 2. St. Blaise and other Christian leaders were persecuted by the Roman emperor Licinius and had to flee into the wilderness. According to legend, those who hunted St. Blaise down found him in a cave surrounded by animals, many of which were sick. St. Blaise cured the beasts of their illnesses.
- 3. St. Blaise saved the life of a boy who had a fishbone stuck in his throat by ordering the child to cough it up. That is how the tradition of St. Blaise throat blessings began.
- 4. St. Blaise was commanded by government officials to worship pagan idols. Because he refused, he was tortured and beheaded.
- 5. St. Blaise is the patron saint of animals and those with throat ailments.

When Should Catholics Not Receive Holy Communion?

- If you have a mortal sin on your soul. Some serious sins include (but are not limited to) being married outside the church, being unmarried but living together or purposely not attending Sunday Mass or holy days of obligation. For more info on what constitutes a mortal sin, refer to the Catechism of the Catholic Church 1857 1859.
- If you have not observed the Eucharistic Fast one hour before receiving. Mints and gum break your fast.
- If you have not yet received First Communion.

Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Holy Communion?

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are not admitted to Holy Communion.

For those who cannot receive Eucharist at this time, we welcome you to join in our liturgy, to pray and sing with us. Please remain in the pew during the Communion Procession, offering your heartfelt prayers to our God of love and mercy. We eagerly await the time when you will join us at the Eucharistic table!

Parish Membership & Benefits:


