A Time of New Life

April boasts the most solemn and sublime events of human history: the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ – the Paschal mystery. Though the way to the Resurrection was the Via Crucis, the Sacrificial Lamb of God is now and forever Christ our Light, the Eternal high priest of the New Covenant. And his sorrowful mother, the Stabat Mater of Good Friday, is now the jubilant Mother of the Regina Caeli.

We the members of Christ's Mystical Body exalt in the mystery by which we were redeemed. If in Baptism we were buried with Christ, so also will we share in his resurrection. By his death we were reborn; "by his stripes we were healed." (Is 53:5) Easter, the epicenter of time, is the event that links time and eternity. It is indeed "the day the Lord has made; let us be glad and rejoice in it." (Ps 118:24)

Highlights of the Month

As our Lenten journey comes to a close we prepare to follow Christ all the way to the cross and to witness His glorious Resurrection. Hopefully we have sacrificed and prayed so that we are now able to more fully reap the fruits of a well spent Lent. After our solemn commemoration of the last days and death of Our Lord we will spend the remainder of the month of April celebrating. As Spring breaks forth even nature will join us as buds and blooms begin to surface and we spend this month basking in the joy of the Resurrection. We continue throughout the entire month our cry, "Christ is risen, Christ is truly risen."

The Feast of Divine Mercy offers us the opportunity to begin again as though we were newly baptized. The unfathomable mercy of God is made manifest today if we but accept His most gracious offer. Easter is the feast of feasts, the unalloyed joy and gladness of all Christians. This truly is "the day that the Lord has made." From Sunday to Sunday, from year to year, the Easters of this earth will lead us to that blessed day on which Christ has promised that He will come again with glory to take us with Him into the kingdom of His Father.

If you are not receiving envelopes currently, please contact the parish office. Parishioners over 18 should register as a household to help us keep records accurate and up-to-date.

When Should Catholics Not Receive Holy Communion?

- If you have a mortal sin on your soul. Some serious sins include (but are not limited to) being married outside the church, being unmarried but living together or purposely not attending Sunday Mass or holy days of obligation. For more info on what constitutes a mortal sin, refer to the Catechism of the Catholic Church 1857 1859.
- If you have not observed the Eucharistic Fast one hour before receiving. **Mints and gum break your fast.**
- If you have not yet received First Communion.

Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Holy Communion?

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are not admitted to Holy Communion.

For those who cannot receive Eucharist at this time, we welcome you to join in our liturgy, to pray and sing with us. Please remain in the pew during the Communion Procession, offering your heartfelt prayers to our God of love and mercy. We eagerly await the time when you will join us at the Eucharistic table!

Will and Estate Planning

Have you considered remembering St. Patrick's in your will or estate plans? A bequest through a Last Will and Testament is the simplest way of creating a lasting legacy of support for St. Pat's. Bequests should be made out to: "The Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, or his successors in office," with a specification of the purpose for which the bequest is to be used (i.e. "for the use of St. Patrick Parish, Weston").

Mass Etiquette

- Men and boys need to remove their hats when entering the church.
- Please remember to silence or turn off your cell phones prior to the start of Mass. Tablets and other gaming devices should not be brought to church.
- When we are in the church, we should refrain from speaking in order to allow for people to pray. If we talk, we should keep our volume to a reverential whisper. This is not because we don't want community. This is to promote prayer with Christ in the Eucharist and to prepare our hearts and minds for Mass. Community time is best for after Mass in the vestibule or outside the church.
- Other people use your pew. Pease take all bulletins, papers, tissues, etc. with you when you leave. Cleanliness is close to Godliness.

Why is Mass Offered for Specific People?

Religious Education Spotlight

Each week we will feature what one of our catechesis programs is learning so that you can briefly refresh your catechetical knowledge.

You can never know too much about our faith!

This week's spotlight: 7th & 8th

Topic: The Beatitudes

According to the catechism, the beatitudes "are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope in the midst of tribulation." They are initially jarring because they are the opposite of what the world defines as happiness. The world's happiness is fleeting: money, power, pleasure. We chase, receive, and then are left unsatisfied. In the beatitudes, Jesus gives us guidelines to obtain the happiness that our souls truly seek; a happiness that truly satisfies- maybe not in the moment but in the light of eternity.

The Beatitudes

1. Blessed are the Poor in Spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs.

To be "poor in spirit" is to be humble, depending on God rather than material possessions.

2. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

We are to mourn due to our inner discontent- we live in a fallen world due to sin and we have contributed to the sinfulness of the world. The evil in our own hearts and in the hearts of others is unsatisfying but the Lord will give true consolation.

3. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

To be meek means to be gentle and have self control. The Greek word for meek means to be "strong as iron and gentle as a feather." There is nothing stronger than those who have the self control to be gentle.

4. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for what is right; they shall be satisfied.

When we hunger for food, food satisfies until we are hungry again; when we hunger and thirst for righteousness we are yearning for moral perfection—to do God's will.

5. Blessed are the merciful; they will be shown mercy.

As is stated in the Our Father, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us..." the Lord will forgive us to the extent that we extend mercy.

6. Blessed are the pure in heart; they shall see God.

To have a pure heart is to have a clear moral vision- seeing the world as God sees it. We must guard our words, thoughts, and deeds so as to guard our hearts from evil.

7. Blessed are the peacemakers; they shall be called the children of God.

As God's children we are called to be peacemakers, reconciling with others and helping others to do the same. How often are we arguing with others? Particularly other Christians?

8. Blessed are those who are persecuted for the sake of what is right, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

When we do what is right in the eyes of God, we will likely be persecuted by the world. We must look to the example of the martyrs and the saints.

Protecting God's Children

VIRTUS is the brand name that identifies best practices programs designed to help prevent wrongdoing and promote "rightdoing" within religious organizations. The VIRTUS programs empower organizations and people to better control risk and improve the lives of all those who interact with the Church.

The word virtus derives from Latin, and means valor, moral strength, excellence, and worth. In ancient times, virtus denoted a way of life and manner of behavior that always aspired to the highest, most positive attributes of people and aspects of human interaction.

All parish and school volunteers who are 18 and older in the Diocese or Wheeling-Charleston need to be Virtus compliant. The number one priority is keeping our children and vulnerable adults safe.

A detailed list of who is considered a volunteer can be found on the diocesan website (dwc.org) in the policy handbook. The list includes readers, money counters, adult altar servers, funeral luncheon workers, choir members, those who volunteer at special events, picnics, and dinners, those who go to school filed trips, attend class parties, work in the library, read to the kids, help with Catholic Schools Week activities etc.

It's both unfortunate and sad that we are living in a time when we have to be constantly vigilant. But, here we are and we have to do what we can to be prepared and protected at all times.

If you have completed Virtus training in the past, you already have an account but you need to e-sign a few new agreements, possibly due a continuing training, and update your background check if it has been more then three years since you last had one through our Virtus program. All of these can be done online. To find out your username please email secretary@spchurchweston.net.

You are welcome to make an appointment at the parish office so Sandy can assist you with the process if you are uncomfortable doing it on your own.



- create a username and password, and continue through the process.




- Complete a background check. Please finish the background check once you start it. The system does not save your progress. You will receive a confirmation number once you have submitted your background check.
- Provide an e signature for the following forms.
 - 1. Reporting Statute Acknowledgement
 - 2. Code of Conduct
 - 3. Policy Relating to Sexual Abuse of Children
- Complete the video training. When that is finished, they will receive a training certificate via email. They do not need to supply us with the certificate for online training. You do not need to do print the certificate. It will become a part of your online account.

Returning users go to the same website and enter their user id and password. Once logged in, you will see a series of boxes. All but the yellow "Reporting Abuse" should be green. If a box is not green and is pink, you need to update something. Please click in that box to update your

information.






