# Trinity Sunday

**Solemnity of The Most Holy Trinity**

The dogma of faith which forms the object of the feast is this: There is one God and in this one God there are three Divine Persons; the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. Yet there are not three Gods, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is not more God than the Son, neither is the Son more God than the Holy Spirit. The Father is the first Divine Person; the Son is the second Divine Person, begotten from the nature of the Father from eternity; the Holy Spirit is the third Divine Person, proceeding from the Father and the Son. No mortal can fully fathom this sublime truth. But I submit humbly and say: Lord, I believe, help my weak faith.

Why is this feast celebrated at this particular time? It may be interpreted as a finale to all the preceding feasts. All three Persons contributed to and shared in the work of redemption. The Father sent His Son to earth, for "God so loved the world as to give His only-begotten Son." The Father called us to the faith. The Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, became man and died for us. He redeemed us and made us children of God. He ever remains the liturgist par excellence to whom we are united in all sacred functions. After Christ's ascension the Holy Spirit, however, became our Teacher, our Leader, our Guide, our Consoler. On solemn occasions a thanksgiving Te Deum rises spontaneously from Christian hearts.

The feast of the Most Holy Trinity may well be regarded as the Church's Te Deum of gratitude over all the blessings of the Christmas and Easter seasons; for this mystery is a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost. This feast, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost, should make us mindful that actually every Sunday is devoted to the honor of the Most Holy Trinity, that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall in a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Blessed Trinity is bestowing upon us. The Father created and predestined us; on the first day of the week He began the work of creation. The Son redeemed us; Sunday is the "Day of the Lord," the day of His resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us His temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, therefore, is the day of the Most Holy Trinity. —Excerpted from The Church's Year of Grace, Pius Parsch

Parish Membership & Benefits:	When Should Catholics Not Receive Holy Communion?
To be considered an "active" member of any parish (and thus eligible for Sacraments, sponsor eligibility, and the "Active Parishioner Rate of tuition" at a Catholic school), the parish takes into account the following things. First, to receive a discount at a Catholic School or to receive a sacrament, the children MUST attend weekend Mass. Second, family & individual involvement in parish life and ministries are taken into consideration. Mass attendance is only able to be tracked accurately via collection envelopes. If you are not receiving envelopes currently, please contact the parish office. Parishioners over 18 should register as a household to help us keep records accurate and up-to-date.	• If you have a mortal sin on your soul. Some serious sins include (but are not limited to) being married outside the church, being unmarried but living together or purposely not attending Sunday Mass or holy days of obligation. # **Catechesis of the Good Shepherd**

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Level I takes place in a room we call the atrium. It is a place specially prepared to nurture the child's relationship with God. In this place every material is prepared with a specific purpose to aid in the child's understanding of our Catholic faith. The children in Level 1 range from 3-6 years old and from their first day in the atrium we share with them the reality of Jesus as true God and true Man. It is a gift we give to the little ones to begin their life of faith – rooted in the reality that Jesus was a real person, who came at a real time and to a real place.

When we present a material to a child the catechist is careful to always proclaim that truth that Christ has died, and Christ is Risen! By never separating the two – the child is provided a foundation that is crucial to a deeper knowing of who God is. From here, the child can build on this foundation and deeply experience Life in the Church.

Our last day in the atrium with the children took place just before Pentecost.

By this time in the year the children have spent much time meditating on the great events in Jesus' life – from His infancy to His resurrection - and it is a great joy to then introduce the children to the celebration of the Feast of Pentecost.

Our celebration in the atrium begins with a child-led procession. Each child is given an item to carry in the procession to reflect the change in the Liturgical Season. The procession was just a short walk down the hall and back, but filled with beauty as the children sang, Sanctus Veni Spiritus (Come, Holy Spirit). The children took turns preparing our special prayer table with the items carried during the procession and were each given an unlit candle. Two children assisted in the proclamation of Scripture by holding lit candles during the catechist's solemn reading of the account of Pentecost in Acts 2:1-4a. After the reading – the catechist led a moment of reflection of what was heard by the children, followed by a second reading of the scripture text. (This Lectio-Devina type meditation is used with nearly every material in the atrium and is a beautiful way for all to enter more deeply into the Word).

On the prayer table 7 candles had been set out– each to represent one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The catechist then briefly introduced each gift. During this introduction the children are encouraged to wonder in their hearts about which gift they might feel God calling them to receive. The group then sang again, Sanctus Veni Spiritus, as each child/ adult was invited to place their candle in front of the gift they would like to receive. Once everyone added their candle to the table, we concluded our year in the atrium with a

moment of invited prayer with the children. The children and adults offered their own words of prayer and quiet prayer in the heart. The celebration of Pentecost then concluded in the atrium and was followed by a very fun surprise Birthday Party! Traditionally, Pentecost is celebrated as the "Birth of the Church" –

which the children fully celebrated with, what else, RED cupcakes!



If you would like to learn more about Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS), please consider coming to the Diocesan sponsored Catechist formation the week of June 19th. There is no expectation to volunteer for the program following completion of the training week (seriously!!).

We encourage ALL PARISHONERS to attend - especially those who serve children in their family or career. We have an awesome number of women attending formation and would gladly welcome more! We would like to make a special appeal to the men of the parish to consider attending formation. As children grow, it becomes more and more important that their faith is informed by both men and women. Please consider investing your time in this training, which will equip you to go deeper in your own faith and teach you how to share our Catholic faith in an effective way.
