## **SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT**

December 10th, 2023

Mass Readings for the Second Sunday of Advent, Cycle B:

The First Reading is from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11. To help us prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas, the Church recalls the prophecies of the great Isaiah on each of the four Sundays of Advent. The prophet's words of comfort and consolation, addressed to his fellow exiles in Babylon, apply to Christian with infinitely greater force and meaning. The exiles were told that their liberation from enemy captivity was at hand. God would bring them back to Judea, to end their earthly days in freedom, but not without much struggle and strife. These same words have their real fulfillment in Christ. For us they have a meaning which goes beyond the confines of this world and of this limited life. The liberation from Babylon was but a shadow of the messianic redemption brought to all men by the incarnation, death and resurrection of Christ.

The Second Reading is from the Second Letter of St. Peter 3:8-14. "We wait for new heavens and a new earth." That is the principal reason for our existence on this earth. We have a number of secondary purposes to fulfill, but each must contribute toward our attaining the primary and principal purpose: our eternal existence in heaven. We are intended by God to be citizens of the "new universe." He has given us our citizenship papers. He has most carefully mapped the road we should travel. He has given us all the material and spiritual helps we need on the journey but, God though he be, he cannot bring us to heaven unless we cooperate with him.

The Gospel is from the Gospel of Mark 1:1-8 "The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." In twelve words St. Mark sums up the initiation of the greatest event that ever occurred in our human history, an event whose culmination would be not on earth but in heaven. God fulfilled the plan he had for us when creation began. He raised us up to the dignity of divine sonship by the Incarnation. The eternal Son of God "humbled himself" and joined our human nature to his divinity, thus making us his brothers and capable of sharing with him the eternal kingdom of his Father. Mark's story was, in fact, the greatest "good news" that man had ever received on earth. It is still the greatest, most astounding and, at the same time, most consoling new for us today. Let each one of us ask himself today: am I for Christ or against him? Am I on the road to heaven or am I facing in the opposite direction?

- If you have a mortal sin on your soul. Some serious sins include (but are not limited to) being married outside the church, being unmarried but living together or purposely not attending Sunday Mass or holy days of obligation. For more info on what constitutes a mortal sin, refer to the Catechism of the Catholic Church 1857 1859.
- If you have not observed the Eucharistic Fast one hour before receiving. Mints and gum break your fast.
- If you have not yet received First Communion.

## Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Holy Communion?

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are not admitted to Holy Communion.

For those who cannot receive Eucharist at this time, we welcome you to join in our liturgy, to pray and sing with us. Please remain in the pew during the Communion Procession, offering your heartfelt prayers to our God of love and mercy. We eagerly await the time when you will join us at the Eucharistic table!

## **Eucharistic Testimony**

### A Eucharistic Revival Initiative

Holy Mother Church! What wisdom she brings in giving us the Liturgical Calendar. I love that we get a "jump" on the New Year that the world celebrates on January 1st. I so love that when the world is focused on the hustle and bustle of Christmas, Mother Church calls us to Be Still and Watch. And as I grow in my faith, I have come to adore the Bread of Life Holy Mother Church provides in the humble form of wheat and water. I am a convert to the Catholic faith. In high school, I was drawn to the Church when a friend told me about the "succession of Peter". Yet, what first drew me to the Church is not what has kept me here. What has kept me here is Jesus, fully present in the eucharist.

I had been Catholic for nearly 10 years before I encountered the eucharist exposed in a monstrance. At that time the parish we belonged to had an adoration chapel which was accessible around the clock throughout the year. In that tiny room, so beautifully adorned that it brought to mind the idea of a throne room, I experienced my first deep encounter with my Jesus in the eucharist. I think it took me those previous 10 years, since my conversion to the Catholic faith, to submit to a moment of deep quiet. I am eternally grateful for that blessed moment when my mind and my heart were still enough to hear the whisperings of my Lord and my God. Gazing at the Blessed Sacrament I had a deep awareness of what (or whom) I truly receive when I receive the Host. That moment echoes in my heart still today so deeply that even after 28 years its beauty, truth and goodness can revisit me when I receive communion.

In the adoration chapel the Host was exposed on a small altar. This particular evening, I was by myself in the chapel, but not alone. So very not alone. On this occasion I brought with me a host of my "enemies": my sins. I carried these enemies with me even after visiting confession because of my shame and frustration of never being able to "get it right". That evening, as I was delivering in "prayer" my litany of faults and failures, I heard deep in my heart, "shhhhhhh." It was a not the sharp shushing of a tired, frustrated mom, but a gentle shushing of one who knows the source of the pain, the depth of the wound and the way to being free of both. For a time, I really don't know how long it was, I felt the peace of His True Presence. The reality of that moment has never left me. I am so thankful my heart remembers, because my mind is too often forgetful of the Truth that moment professed.

Awhile back I noticed some young people kneeling quietly and remaining in the church for a little bit after Mass. I wondered why I never thought to linger just a little longer myself. Taking up that simple practice myself has helped me revisit the blessings of long ago in that adoration chapel. I love to take a moment just to wrap His gentle "shhh" around my heart again after communion. I love to imagine His Flesh enveloping my ragged heart and making it like His own, little by little with each eucharistic meal. I hope my heart looks to Him like a sort of patchwork quilt of His Love. It is glorious to know God desires to transform my heart! For a moment I am in my own little adoration chapel!

It has been nearly 30 years since I had the good fortune of visiting a perpetual adoration chapel on a weekly basis and I so miss that practice. It is true, though, that Jesus abides within me acutely in the moments after receiving communion. He is present and His presence makes my very being a sort of tabernacle, a throne room. He is my King and has come to the home of my heart! Would that I could stop time (and the chaos of my thoughts) to keep His Presence always in the fore of my life like it is in this moment! I am deeply thankful to enjoy this feast along with the family of believers gathered around the table of the altar! "Jesus meek and humble of heart, make my heart like unto Thine."


### **Names for Christmas Food Baskets**
