THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



The Gospel is from the Gospel of Mark 1:14-20. Jesus came to announce to all men the good news of God's eternal plan for them. He spent his public life convincing the Jews of Palestine of the truth of this message, and he died on the cross because he claimed to be that he was God's divine Son, who had come in human nature to raise all men to the standing and status of adopted sons of God. That very death, cruel and unjust though it was, was part of the divine plan. He conquered death and was raised from the grave to prove that we too, if we accept his divine gospel and live by it, will be raised from the dead and reign with Christ in the kingdom of his Father forever. Christ preached this doctrine in Palestine. It is the doctrine for which he gave his human life and which he gave to his Apostles to hand down to all future generations. This is the self-same doctrine preached by Christ's Church to all men today. It is the good news of God's mercy and love toward us weak, mortal creatures. To some it seems too good to be true; it would indeed be so if God were a limited, finite being like us, but he is Being itself. He is without limit, his goodness and love are limitless as is his nature. What God can see in creatures has ever been a puzzle to thinking man. One of the psalm-writers said centuries ago: "What is man that you should spare a thought for him, the son of man that you should care for him" (Ps. 8 :4)? Many a saint too, has repeated this remark ever since.

We cannot hope to fathom the mind of God, nor do we need to. He has gone to such a length as the humiliation of his divine Son in the incarnation in order to give us a new standing in relation to himself and a new mode of eternal living after death. We are still God's creatures, "the work of his hands," but through accepting Christ and his gospel—his message of divine truth—we are no longer mere mortals. We shall die, but death is the beginning of the true life which God has arranged for us. It is no wonder that St. Paul could cry out: "O death where is your victory, O death, where is your sting?"

We Christians should be the happiest people on earth. We know why we are here, we know where we are going and we know how to get there. There are trials and troubles which beset us on our journey; there are rough parts of the road and weaknesses in our human nature which often lead us off the right road, but we are not left to our own human resources. We have help from above to strengthen and comfort us on our journey. We have divine aids in the Church which Christ set us and we have the guarantee of our Good Shepherd that he will keep us in his fold or bring us back should we foolishly wander from it (Jn. 10: 14; Lk. 1.5:4-7).

We Christians can indeed be the happiest people on earth, if we live according to the divine good news revealed to us through Christ. "Repent and believe in the gospel," Christ told the people of Galilee. The same call goes out from our loving Savior to each of us today: repent—change your outlook on life— and see it as God sees it to be for us, a short journey toward heaven. If we really believe in the gospel of Christ, the revelation of God's plan for our eternal happiness, our earthly troubles will look small, our trials and temptations will appear to us as they really are—a means of earning the eternal victory. Christ, the innocent victim for our salvation, has gone before us, carrying his heavy cross; can we refuse to carry the relatively lighter cross which he places on our shoulders as our means of making atonement for our own failings and for those of our fellowmen? God forbid that we should! If we have failed in the past, let us repent today and show our belief in the truth of the Christian gospel, by living as true Christians who are on their way to heaven.

- If you have not observed the Eucharistic Fast one hour before receiving.
 Mints and gum break your fast.
- If you have not yet received First Communion.

Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Holy Communion?

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are not admitted to Holy Communion.

Eucharistic Testimony

A Eucharistic Revival Initiative

"...this is no other but the House of God..."

The most real, lasting, and important Presence in the world has no fireworks, no strobe lights, no deafening music. It is not a Presence that demands attention; and is in fact usually left alone day and night—despite its immeasurable worth.

It is QUIET---with a small red light hanging silently above. Look up.

From birth onward I am what they call a "cradle Catholic" --- from both sides of the cradle. Parents, family, the sisters at St. Patrick School, exemplary clergy, fellow (and "non-fellow") co-parishioners all taught, and SHOWED, me what Catholics believe about Our Lord Really Present---though clearly and humbly appearing to be bread and wine. In addition to genuflecting when passing in front of the tabernacle when I was INSIDE, I was even taught to make the Sign of the Cross when OUTSIDE, walking or driving past the center of the church. The church is the House of God.

The Jews had the Ark of the Covenant in the Temple's Holy of Holies; we have the Holy in the Holy of Holies. It is, after all, the House of God.

I smile to this very day when watching a parent teach a small child to genuflect. First efforts may find the child genuflecting toward the back of the church or toward the wall. But the child is learning to genuflect before the presence of God, taking first steps that will lead to fuller understanding. A smile-inducing beginning that is so encouraging to see.

Let me be clear that being a "cradle Catholic" is not a surer guarantee of deeper faith than coming to the Faith later in life. Both "Cradle" and "Later" Catholic can unthinkingly "take for granted" belief in the Real Presence, or even perhaps reject the Belief. God always offers, but does not (usually) twist arms.

So pray for the Gift of Faith and of keeping it. You see, Belief is obviously NOT incredible (pardon the play on words); but it surely is a Gift.

And the center...the very heart...of being a Catholic is belief in the Real Presence of Our Lord in the Eucharist. If THAT is not our Faith, we may well be good people, even Christians, but we are not Catholic. The Real Presence is not "off to the side" in the Catholic church.

As children we may have the Faith "in our head"; but as adults we must bring the Faith down into our heart. Paraphrasing what one priest recently preached: "The journey from our head to our heart can be among the longest of journeys." Faith is not just for children.

Many enlightened modern people will "write off" belief in the Real Presence as nostalgic "brainwashing" that defies scientific proof. But, come on..., we human beings "know" things on deeper levels than demonstrable physical proofs. Many people I have met---Catholic and non-Catholic---"sense" and "know" something particularly sacred in a Catholic church. It is the Real Presence of Our Lord. A Catholic church radiates a perceptible sacredness.

Do you remember the story of "The Hunchback of Notre Dame"? (If not, look up the book or the movie.) In the story the misshapen Quasimodo seeks Sanctuary in the Cathedral of Notre Dame. In Roman Imperial Law, being on "sacred ground" provided safety and immunity from legal prosecution.

In the ever-changing, "insane"ifying busyness of life today, could we not all benefit from a little "Sanctuary" time. We somehow manage to make time for ever-increasing, too often trivial, little daily demands. So you don't have time for a retreat. Well how about a few minutes a week (ok, too much?...how about a month) before the quiet Presence of God in the tabernacle—with the silent light above? Solid ground for the soul to stand on in a world of shifting sand.

As well as within us, in this world of constant change, the unchanging Real Presence of God in the Eucharist remains dependably at our service---for our consolation and for our Saving.

It is "as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be"--- solid ground.

Seek solid ground; it's really nearby. What reverence does God and the House of God not deserve?

St. Patrick's School was well represented at the Lewis County Spelling Bee with seven participants.






