FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The Gospel is from St. Luke 10:25-37 and tells the parable of the good Samaritan. This passage is two-pronged. While providing a powerful lesson about mercy toward those in need, it also proclaims that non-Jews can observe the Law and thus enter into eternal life. Following other Fathers, St Augustine (De verbis Domini sermones, 37) identifies the good Samaritan with our Lord, and the waylaid man with Adam, the source and symbol of all fallen mankind. Moved by compassion and piety, he comes down to earth to cure man's wounds, making them his own (Is 53:4; Mt 8:17; 1 Pet 2:24; 1 Jn 3:5). In fact, we often see Jesus being moved by man's suffering (cf. Mt 9:36; Mk 1:41; Lk 7:13). And St John says: "in this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 Jn 4:9-11).

This parable leaves no doubt about who our neighbor is — anyone (without distinction of race or relationship) who needs our help; nor about how we should love him — by taking pity on him, being compassionate towards his spiritual or corporal needs; and it is not just a matter of having the right feelings towards him: we must do something, we must generously serve him.

Christians, who should be disciples of Christ, should share his love and compassion, never distancing themselves from others' needs. One way to express love for one's neighbor is to perform the "works of mercy," which get their name from the fact that they are not duties in justice. There are fourteen such works, seven spiritual and seven corporal.



The Spiritual Works of Mercy are:
 To convert the sinner;
 To instruct the ignorant;
 To counsel the doubtful;
 To comfort the sorrowful;
 To bear wrongs patiently;
 To forgive injuries;

To pray for the living and the dead.

The Corporal Works of Mercy are:
 To feed the hungry;
 To give drink to the thirsty;
 To clothe the naked;
 To shelter the homeless;
 To visit the sick;
 To visit the imprisoned;
 To bury the dead.



Fatima Prayer ~ A Prayer for Mercy and Peace A Gift from our Blessed Mother

Trust Jesus with childlike faith and pray with that same sincere demeanor – humble, honest, reverent, and pure.

Our world needs it. Our Blessed Virgin Mary the Mother of God gave us this mindset 108 years ago today.

On July 13, 1917, Our Lady of Fatima appeared for the third time to the three little shepherd children, Francisco, Jacinta, and Lucia. In Fatima, Portugal.

After the Blessed Virgin Mary gave them a horrific glimpse of the fires of hell, she raised their gaze to the heavens and made a plea for them to recite a special prayer after each decade of the Rosary. Today we refer to it as the Fatima or Decade Prayer. The Fatima Prayer became an official optional prayer as part of the rosary in the Church in October of 1930. It is recited after each Glory Be at the end of each decade.

We recite the words of the prayer exactly as given by Our Lady of Fatima:

O my Jesus!
Forgive us our sins,
save us from the fires of hell.
Lead all souls to heaven,
especially those
who are most in need
of thy mercy.

Even though the prayer is short it reflects the heart of Mary and our faith with themes of sin, forgiveness, heaven, hell, and the saving grace and mercy of God. Upon their first reciting of the prayer to the moments of their passing, they shared this prayer with others as promised to Mary in all of their humility to share with the world.

Let us say this prayer reverently and often, calling upon our Blessed Mother Mary to take our intentions to her son Our Lord, empowering us to promote peace in our families, communities, and world.



A Quick Glance at the Psalms

This past Tuesday, I had the honor of sitting in on a meeting of our parish's weekly prayer group. This week's meeting was spent praying with and discussing this Sunday's readings. What stood out to me the most from our discussion was the fact that there are multiple ways to pray the Psalms. For many Christians, it's often hard to connect with the Psalms and relate them to our daily lives. For example, the language of Psalm 83 is such that it appears daunting and cumbersome to pray with. Psalm 51, on the other hand, is much more popular, partially due to its accessibility. Looking at these two Psalms side by side, we can see different ways to approach the Lord with deep contrition and love. In the first example, Psalm 51, we hear King David's plea for forgiveness following his adultery with Bathsheba.

Have mercy on me. O God. according to thy steadfast love; according to thy abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin! For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Against thee, thee only, have I sinned, and done that which is evil in thy sight, so that thou art justified in thy sentence and blameless in thy judament. (Psalms 51:1-4 RSV)

David has given us such a beautiful prayer to relate to here. Whenever we fall into sin, this Psalm can be a prayer of

reconciliation and great comfort and that can be used as an act of contrition before the Lord However as

contrition before the Lord. However, as we approach the end of the Psalm, it seems to get both

confusing and not very relatable. In the last four verses, David speaks of acceptable sacrifice, and

promises bulls to be offered on the altar once the walls of Jerusalem have been rebuilt.

Do good to Zion in thy good pleasure; rebuild the walls of Jerusalem, then wilt thou delight in right sacrifices,

in burnt offerings and whole burnt offerings;

then bulls will be offered on thy altar. (Psalms 51:18-19 RSV)

In today's age, there is only one sacrifice on the altar, the Sacrifice of the Mass. We

cannot take David in a literal sense when praying this Psalm for ourselves—so please don't sacrifice any bulls. Instead, we can apply it to what we are asking from God in being reconciled to Him. When we ask God to restore us to grace, we are also asking Him to rebuild our walls and defenses against sin. More importantly, we ask the Lord to restore us to a right relationship with Him—one in which we are a joy to Him by our very existence in His presence. The love we

share with Him in this communion is what propels us into making "sacrifices" of our lives in little acts of love for our neighbor. We can relate the end of this Psalm to the asking of God for grace to live the Christian life as a result of our reconciliation to Him. Psalm 83, however, is one in which this spiritual sense we used for the end of Psalm 51 can be beneficial for praying with it in its entirety. To illustrate this, here is Psalm 83:

O God, do not keep silence; do not hold thy peace or be still, O God! For lo, thy enemies are in tumult; those who hate thee have raised their heads.

They lay crafty plans against thy people; they consult together against thy protected ones.

They say, "Come, let us wipe them out as a nation;

let the name of Israel be remembered no more!"

Yea, they conspire with one accord; against thee they make a covenant—the tents of Edom and the Ishmaelites, Moab and the Hagrites,

Gebal and Ammon and Amalek, Philistia with the inhabitants of Tyre; Assyria also has joined them;

they are the strong arm of the children of Lot.

Do to them as thou didst to Midian, as to Sisera and Jabin at the river Kishon, who were destroyed at En-dor, who became dung for the ground. Make their nobles like Oreb and Zeeb, all their princes like Zebah and

all their princes like Zebah and Zalmunna, who said, "Let us take possession for

ourselves of the pastures of God."

O my God, make them like whirling dust, like chaff before the wind.

As fire consumes the forest, as the flame sets the mountains ablaze, so do thou pursue them with thy tempest and terrify them with thy hurricane! Fill their faces with shame, that they may seek thy name, O Lord. Let them be put to shame and dismayed for ever; let them perish in disgrace. Let them know that thou alone, whose name is the Lord, art the Most High over all the earth. (Psalms 83:1-18 RSV)

On an initial reading of the Psalm, it's easy to be startled by this call of wrath from God on the enemies of Israel. This is absolutely NOT a place in the scriptures to pray for the grace to forgive someone—but it is a place in scripture to pray for the grace to overcome something! For

any vice that seemingly defeats us over and over, this is a great place to turn for overcoming such evil. We are told to hate the sin, not the sinner, and we should definitely hate our vices! The prayer then becomes an act of begging the Lord's mercy in delivering us from such treacherous habits and bringing us to peaceful joy in union with Him. I think this stands out most in the final verse:

Let them know that thou alone, whose name is the Lord, art the Most High over all the earth. (Psalms 83:18 RSV)

Let our vices and our sinfulness know that the Lord has dominion over them, and that

through His grace they can be thrust into hell and burden us no longer. For Christ Himself says:

Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. (Matthew 11:28 RSV)

The Psalms are an excellent place to turn for prayer throughout the day when facing any struggle. I highly encourage you all to take a look at the Psalms this week and take the time to pray with one.
