SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Commentary

The Gospel is from St. Luke, 10:38-42 and recounts the familiar story of Martha and Mary. St Augustine comments on this scene as follows: "Martha, who was arranging and preparing the Lord's meal, was busy doing many things, whereas Mary preferred to find her meal in what the Lord was saying. In a way she deserted her sister, who was very busy, and sat herself down at Jesus' feet and just listened to his words. She was faithfully obeying what the Psalm said: 'Be still, and know that I am God' (Ps 46:10). Martha was getting annoyed, Mary was feasting; the former coping with many things, the latter concentrating on one. occupations were good" (Sermon 103).

Martha has come to be, as it were, the symbol of the active life, and Mary that of the contemplative life. However, for most Christians, called as they are to sanctify themselves in the middle of the world. action and contemplation cannot be regarded as two opposite ways of practicing the Christian faith: an active life forgetful of union with God is useless and barren; but an apparent life of prayer which shows no concern for apostolate and the sanctification of ordinary things also fails to please God. The key lies in being able to combine these two lives, without either harming the other. Close union between action and contemplation can be achieved in very different ways, depending on the specific vocation each person is given by God.—Excerpted from The Navarre Bible— St. Luke

Humility with Confidence

Many of you may be familiar with Little Thérèse of Lisieux: a French Carmelite nun from the turn of the twentieth century. She is a great saint known for her numerous miracles, care for priests and seminarians, and most notably her little way of love. One of the most beautiful examples of her wisdom before the Lord is shown in her letters with Maurice Bellière: a seminarian she adopted as a spiritual brother at the request of her mother superior. Maurice, like many people, was plagued with struggles accepting God's love for him despite his many sins. In one letter she wrote to him, Thérèse offers this simple and beautiful reflection:

I'd like to try to make you understand, by a very simple example, how much Jesus loves even very imperfect souls, who trust in Him:

I'm thinking of a father who has two children who are mischievous and disobedient, and when he comes to punish them he sees one who trembles and draws away from him in fright, knowing in the bottom of his heart that he deserves to be punished, his brother on the contrary, throws himself into his father's arms, protesting that he is sorry for hurting him, that he loves him and that to prove it he will be good from now on. Then if this child asks his father to punish him with a kiss, I doubt that the heart of the happy father will be able to resist the childlike confidence of his son, of whose sincerity he is sure. He's well aware that child will often fall back into the same faults, but he's always ready to forgive him provided the boy always grasps him by the heart. I say nothing about the first child, dear little brother surely you know yourself, whether his father can love him as much as the other, and treat him with the same indulgence.

(Maurice and Thérèse: The Story of a Love p167)

How often do we act with fear like the first child? Well aware of our sins, we try to run and hide from God's mercy while thinking we are running from His justice. We find it easy to remember the punishment of God and all the many many sins we've committed throughout our lives. We look with fear at a justice we so thoroughly deserve.

"Why would He forgive me of this again?"

"Is it really contrition if I do it again within a couple days?"

"Am I presuming His mercy if I think I'm going to fall into it again?"

"How could God forget such a sin so simply in confession?"

What a horrible disservice we do to ourselves by thinking of God as a tyrant rather than as a father. The Lord is not out to get you, in fact He does everything but condemn those who seek Him! Look at what the Gospel says:

Or what man of you, if his son asks him for bread, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!

(Matthew 7:9-11 RSV)



The Lord's mercy is beyond our comprehension and is unending. There is nothing you have done that is beyond His forgiveness and, on top of that, His greatest desire is for you to ask Him for His mercy. The Lord is not holding a pen and paper counting your mistakes, He's cheering you on and constantly giving you all the grace you need to overcome your favorite sins. This is what Thérèse is touching on with the reaction of the second son. The second son throws himself into his father's arms because he knows that his father's greatest desire is the love between them. The father is entirely aware of the weakness of his child and reioices in the child's desire to overcome it after each and every fall. He is patiently waiting to put him back on his feet again and again.

as far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us.

(Psalms 103:12 RSV)

So what does this mean practically? I think a good place to start is to look at what our immediate reaction when we've committed a grave sin is. A good practice is to immediately make an act of contrition in which you promise to confess your sins and right in that moment plan when you will seek confession. Throw yourself into His arms again and again and again. The Lord desires your holiness. Why would you fear your greatest fan? Little Thérèse understood this, and even more explicitly than in her letters to Maurice, on her death bed she said this regarding her confidence in the mercies of the Lord:

It is not because I have been preserved from mortal sin that I lift up my heart to God in trust and love. I feel that even had I on my conscience every crime one could commit, I should lose nothing of my confidence: my heart broken with sorrow, I would throw myself into the Arms of my Saviour. I know that He loves the Prodigal Son, I have heard His words to St. Mary Magdalen, to the woman taken in adultery, and to the woman of Samaria. No one could frighten me, for I know what to believe concerning His Mercy and His Love. And I know that all that multitude of sins would disappear in an instant, even as a drop of water cast into a flaming furnace.

If this is something that you struggle with, I highly recommend seeking the intercession of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, especially in reading her autobiography Story of a Soul.
