





BEAUTY, THE ETERNAL CITY AND MEETING THE POPE

Having been in Rome now for a little over a month, I have been quite privileged to have a number of experiences that I could have never expected to have, yet alone in such rapid succession. The most striking part of Rome, by far, is the readily observable beauty which pervades the entire city. Not only the churches and the grand piazza's with baroque fountains but simply just the façade of every building just radiates beauty before functionality in a way which we're not accustomed to in the States. It has quickly become one of my favorite parts of living in Rome. Each day when I decide to go out for a random walk around the city, or even when I go to run errands or something like that,

I encounter beauty everywhere in a way which is unusual, and still new to me. It makes me question, at least partially, how we think about architecture in general. As Americans, we tend to build for longevity and functionality. We tend however to oppose those ideals to beauty. The Romans tend to build thinking of beauty first, and everything else just sort of falls into place. The pantheon for example, still stands 2,000 years later and is easily one of the most beautiful buildings in the city. It was built to be beautiful, but it stands today, transformed from a pagan temple into a Catholic Church, captivating the hearts and minds of people who pass it by.

It's gotten me thinking however, what is the purpose of all this beauty? What end does it serve? Certainly it costs a little extra, so there must be a principled reason to undertake such an expense for seemingly no reason. In fact, beauty seems perfectly useless. Yet, deep down, we still know that it is noble, and worthy. We don't build strictly for functionality (most of the time). I think, that the principal reason that beauty is so important, is because it calls the mind to what is beyond our present experience. We see something beautiful, and we think, at least on some level, that this must be what heaven is like. Heaven, indeed, will be far more beautiful, more beautiful than we could possibly imagine, but beauty, I propose, serves to remind us that heaven exists. In fact, one of the biggest goals of most communist regimes is to eliminate western ideas of beauty because it eliminates this sort of subconscious consideration. When all there is are concrete buildings, there is nothing to ponder, nothing to serve, except the regime. Beauty is the antidote then to a certain type of spiritual worldliness, wherein we consider only the here and now.



We're extremely blessed to belong to a very beautiful parish. There is art in the church, the looks are timeless and ancient all at once. A great effort is put forth to have beautiful music and vestments and liturgy, and all of these things come at a considerable cost, both monetary and labor.



But these things are meant to be a labor of love. An expense which is undertaken simply because of what it intends to serve, namely Almighty God. But remember also, that it serves your brothers and sisters, who are (or at least should be) drawn into that same consideration of beauty by the efforts undertaken. So yes, beauty is perfectly useless, but that is what makes it so wonderfully useful. It serves no ulterior motives, other than itself.

Finally, I've had opportunity to meet the pope, personally, up close, since being here in Rome. That was a kind of crazy experience. I would have never imagined that it would come only three days after having arrived in this city. It was such a wonderful blessing to have met His Holiness, and he spoke to us all, young seminarians, of the need for perseverance in the priesthood.

Gesturing to his white cassock, he said, "You have to pray for perseverance, because you never know when the Lord might surprise you." It was so evident, in even such a short exchange, that the Holy Father is clearly a man of a deep interior life, and that it is from that relationship with the Lord that he draws to offer words of encouragement and guidance to us all.

In closing, please pray for me, and pray for Pope Leo XIV, that the Lord may aid us both in perseverance. Know of my prayers for you, and for our parish community.
